especially but not exclusively in their gendered and racialised dimensions within this broad frame it considers the impact of space identity ritual and or ceremony on the institutional form of parliament how power is shaped within it how the behaviour of members is facilitated constrained and shaped how power and rituals interact to and how they impinge upon the relationships between representative institutions and citizens contributions are theoretical and empirical comparative or single country studies of national or sub national legislatures they have interdisciplinary historical or postcolonial perspectives that contribute to this emerging field in the study of parliaments this book was previously published as a special issue of the journal of legislative studies
