continent sized great powers compete for territory resources and prestige by recalling diplomacy's rich past we can equip ourselves for a more dangerous future

in sustainable history and human dignity professor nayef al rodhan shows that it is the human quest for sustainable governance balancing the ever present tension between nine human dignity needs and three human nature attributes emotionality amorality egoism that has and will most profoundly shape the course of history beginning with an ocean model of a single collective human civilisation al rodhan constructs a common human story comprised of multiple geo cultural domains and sub cultures with a history of mutual borrowing and synergies if humanity as a whole is to flourish all of these diverse geo cultural domains must succeed only thus can lasting peace and prosperity be achieved for all especially in the face of civilisational frontier risks and highly disruptive technologies in the twenty first century

few scholars have provided as much insight into the struggle of leaders ideas and policies as paul w schroeder constantly challenging conventional views and drawing upon a masterly command of the sources and literature schroeder provides new answers to old questions about international history and politics since the age of napoleon were european international relations really driven by balance of power politics or has that traditional view blinded us to an underlying normative consensus on the rules of the game that frequently contributed to cooperation among the leading states in the system are alliances primarily a means of the aggregation of power against stronger states or do states often use alliances as instruments of influence or control over their allies was world war i contingent upon a confluence of independent processes that intersected in 1914 or was it the product of more deeply rooted and interconnected structural forces that pushed inevitably toward war what is the role of moral judgment in historical investigation raising new questions and offering provocative new interpretations schroeder encourages historians and political scientists alike to reconsider their long standing beliefs about the evolution and dynamics of modern diplomacy

intelligence has never been a more important factor in international affairs than it is today since the end of the second world war vast intelligence bureaucracies have emerged to play an increasingly important role in the making of national policy within all major states one of the biggest problems within the contemporary thinking about intelligence and international relations is a lack of historical context observers routinely comment on the challenges facing intelligence communities without reflecting on the historical forces that have shaped these communities over the past two centuries as presented in this volume new perspectives on the evolution of intelligence services and intelligence practice over the past 200 years can only enrich ongoing debates over how best to reform national intelligence structures the practices of war and international politics were transformed by the conflicts of the french revolution and the napoleonic era one of the most important outcomes of this transformation was the gradual emergence of permanent and increasingly professionalized intelligence services within the military and foreign policy establishments of the great powers the contributions in this volume consider the causes and consequences of this trend as well as its impact on war strategy and statecraft the rise of permanent intelligence bureaucracies has combined with technological progress to transform practices of intelligence collection and analysis that have remained essentially unchanged since the roman era ultimately however the nature and

limits of intelligence have remained constant rendering intelligence little or no more effective in reducing uncertainty at the opening of the 21st century than in centuries past

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
