experts from multiple disciplines assess how data on physical development education economic security family and neighborhood conditions and social behavior are collected and analyzed what findings they reveal and what improvements are needed to create a more comprehensive and policy relevant system of measurement today s climate of welfare reform has opened new possibilities for program innovation and experimentation but it has also intensified the need for a clearly defined and wide ranging empirical framework to pinpoint where help is needed and what interventions will succeed indicators of children s well being emphasizes the importance of accurate studies that address real problems essays on children s material well being show why income data must be supplemented with assessments of housing medical care household expenditure food consumption and education other contributors urge refinements to existing survey instruments such as the census and the current population survey the usefulness of records from human service agencies child welfare records and juvenile court statistics is also evaluated

can justice be achieved in voluntary cases or is it purely a matter for courts to determine using a multi disciplinary framework which has at its centre a philosophical anthropological view of social work as a moral practice the author explores the notion of justice in public child care the problem of parents and children s rights is addressed first of all in the legal context of care proceedings and then in the social work setting of voluntary care forty six difficult cases are examined to see how decisions are made and implemented in the final analysis the dimensions of social and legal justice are charted in a way which may contribute to general understanding of these issues and some suggestions are offered about how social work may move forward in response to legitimate criticism

early child care is about the very young child infant toddler and early preschool in today s world it grew out of a series of conferences sponsored by the national institute of mental health the children s hospital of washington d c and the committee on day care of the maternal and child health section of the american public health association each of the sponsoring agencies represents a focal point for pressures from groups concerned with improving the care of the young child faced with common concern the three sponsoring agencies brought together a number of experts in the field to pool information and experience and to review research findings as a basis for sound planning for children less than three years of age the authors included in early child care are pioneers in the true sense of the word until recently no one has tried to specify exactly what goes on between mother and her baby who does what to whom in the exchange and what happens if instead of one
