recipient of a 2023 certificate of merit for best historical research in recorded blues r b gospel hip hop or soul music from the association for recorded sound collections in the late 1920s reverend a w nix 1880 1949 an african american baptist minister born

in texas made fifty four commercial recordings of his sermons on phonographs in chicago on these recordings nix presented vocal traditions and styles long associated with the southern rural black church as he preached about self help racial uplift thrift and christian values as southerners like nix fled into cities in the north to escape the rampant racism in the south they contested whether or not african american vocal styles of singing and preaching that had emerged during the slavery era were appropriate for uplifting the race specific vocal characteristics like those on nix s recordings were linked to the image of the old negro by many african american leaders who favored adopting europeanized vocal characteristics and musical repertoires into african american churches in order to uplift the modern new negro citizen through interviews with family members musical analyses of the sounds on nix s recordings and examination of historical documents and relevant scholarship terri brinegar argues that the development of the phonograph in the 1920s afforded preachers like nix the opportunity to present traditional black vocal styles of the southern black church as modern black voices these vocal styles also influenced musical styles the moaning voice used by nix and other ministers was a direct connection to the blues moan employed by many blues singers including blind willie blind lemon and ma rainey both reverend a w nix and his brother w m nix were an influence on the father of gospel music thomas a dorsey the success of nix s recorded sermons demonstrates the enduring values african americans placed on traditional vocal practices

henry mcneal turner 1834 1915 was a bishop of the african methodist episcopal church one of america s earliest black activists and social reformers and an outspoken proponent of emigration in the speeches of bishop henry mcneal turner the press the platform and the pulpit andre e johnson has compiled selected political speeches sermons lectures and religious addresses delivered by turner in their original form alongside turner s oratory johnson places the speeches in their historical context and traces his influence on black social movements in the twentieth century from w e b du bois s idea of cultural nationalism to marcus garvey s back to africa movement the modern day civil rights movement the black power movement james cone s black liberation theology and more while turner was widely known as a great orator and published copious articles essays and editorials no single collection of only turner s speeches has yet been published and scholars have largely ignored his legacy this volume

recovers a lost voice within american and african american rhetorical history expanding the canon of the african american oratorical tradition

this book examines the imperial spectacles and startling reversals of fortune related in william h prescott s history of the conquest of mexico 1843 and history of the conquest of peru 1847 and investigates how these accounts inspired fictional adaptations by george a henty h rider haggard and george griffith the revision of history in the amerindian adventure both entertained young transatlantic audiences and was a vehicle to attract tourism and investment in countries such as mexico and peru henty haggard and griffith moreover used their tales of adventure as a platform to impart british values to their readers such values compel the characters and narrators of the novels discussed to act as cultural mediators to acquire indigenous languages and adopt native ways of being and in several of the romance adventures under consideration to marry mexican or incan noblewomen part i conquest examines george henty s by right of conquest or with cortez in mexico 1891 h rider haggard s montezuma s daughter 1893 and george griffith s virgin of the sun a tale of the conquest of peru 1898 part ii reclamation argues that english re writings of history work to eclipse the spanish in haggard s virgin the sun 1922 henty s treasure of the incas 1902 and griffith s romance of golden star 1897

from blue note turmoil to grace note power black women preachers stand tall in colored women sittin on high melanie r hill offers a new perspective on the art of the sermon in african american literature music and theology drawing on the womanist cadence

of alicia walker in literature and the rhythmical flow of named womanist theologians hill makes interventions at the intersections of african american literary criticism music and religious studies pushing against the patriarchal dominance that often exists in religious spaces hill argues that black women s religious practice creates a sermonic space that thrives inside and outside the church allowing for a critique of sexism and anti black racism she examines literature by writers such as zora neale hurston and james baldwin music by aretha franklin and ms lauryn hill and sermons by theologians ruby sales and vashti m mckenzie and she takes readers into a sermonic artwork of artists preachers and freedom movement activists who are as hill contends the greatest virtuosic alchemists of our time

cleophus larue argues that the extraordinary character of black preaching derives from a distinctive biblical hermeneutic that views god as involved in practical ways in the lives of african americans this hermeneutic he believes has remained constant since the days of slavery larue analyzes the distinct characteristics of african american preaching and brings the insights of both theory and practice to bear on this important subject matter

transcripts of representative sermons are used to illustrate an appraisal of the language and style of the black preaching tradition

preaching in black and white is the first attempt to bring together a noted black preacher and white preacher to interact on the dynamics of pulpit ministry and what can be learned from each other the conversation between the two authors discusses the similarities and differences in styles of preaching in the two communities

this book presents liberative black preaching lbp as an optimal homiletic model designed to function as a therapeutic intervention for african descent persons in the black church context built upon the foundation of a black theological anthropology this exposition addresses black self identity that is informed by a universal african worldview uaw the book argues that there is a recognizable diversity of contextuality among white and non white persons and that it is possible to qualitatively describe generalizable contours of experience among black people in the united states based on the particularity of the culture and the black encounter with racism white supremacy the thoughts and feelings that emerge from this cultural encounter are appropriate for afri-centric theological reflection historical evidence of the unfolding of black thought with reference to black religiosity and spirituality is presented as a preamble to the construction of the liberative black preaching model

finally a scholarly description of the development of black preaching in the united states that is accessible to the average reader but also contributes to the academic conversation about both style and theological content written from the perspective of a seasoned practitioner and tenured practical theologian thomas surveys black preaching as it has responded to various social and historical time periods starting with the brutality of chattel slavery early formations in segregated southern life rapid migration to

and urbanization in northern cities and various events throughout the post civil rights era the book gives convincing details and examples of how the black preacher helped to guide and sustain the masses of african american people through the wilderness of social change at the heart of the book three prime examples are presented as models of the real genius of black preaching the reader will never again think about reverend martin luther king jr malcolm x and the reverend jesse jackson in the same way a special chapter is devoted to the contributions of black women preachers along with a closing chapter that makes new proposals for the future the book is a provocative and critical analysis of why black preaching still matters
