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the building blocks series presents icons of modern architecture as interpreted by the most significant architectural photographers of our time the first four volumes feature the work of ezra stoller whose photography has defined the way postwar architecture has been viewed by architects historians and the public at large the buildings inaugurating this series eero saarinen s twa terminal wallace harrison s united nations complex le corbusier s chapel at ronchamp and paul rudolph s yale art and architecture building all have bold sculptural presences ideally suited to stoller s unique vision each cloth bound book in the series contains at least 80 pages of rich duotone images taken just after the completion of each project these photographs provide a unique historical record of the buildings in use documenting the people fashions and furnishings of the period through stoller s photographs we see these buildings the way the architects wanted us to know them in the preface to each volume stoller tells of his personal relationship with the architect of each project and recounts his experience photographing it brief introductions reveal the unique history of each building also included are newly drawn plans

marking the centennial of the 1916 establishment of a professional program pedagogy and place is the definitive text on the history of the yale school of architecture robert a m stern current dean of the school and jimmy stamp examine its growth and change over the years and they trace the impact of those who taught or studied there as well as the architecturally significant buildings that housed the program on the evolution of architecture education at yale owing to the impressive number of notable practitioners who have attended or been affiliated with the school this book also contributes a history beyond yale of the architecture profession in the twentieth century featuring extensive archival research and illuminating firsthand accounts from alumni faculty and administrators this well rounded and engaging narrative is richly illustrated with historic photos of the school and its studios images of student work and important architectural achievements on and off campus

conceived by architect charles w moore and begun in the context of social activism and dramatic institutional change during the 1960s the yale building project has contributed to the education of many of this country s leading architects serving as the model for design build programs at universities nationwide the yale building project the first 40 years is the first comprehensive history of this important initiative every year since 1967 graduate students in the yale school of architecture have designed and constructed a building for a community based client this book documents each of the projects alongside essays that situate the program in its historical context from students journeys to rural appalachia to build community centers and a

health clinic to pavilions and recreational structures constructed throughout connecticut and affordable housing built in new haven describing a program that has had a profound effect on american architectural culture this book will serve as a valuable resource for architects historians students and community planners distributed for the yale university school of architecture

the yale center for british art stands as the final masterpiece of the great twentieth century american architect louis i kahn 1901 1974 the building received the 2005 american institute of architects twenty five year award honoring significant architectural landmarks that have withstood the test of time with perfect proportions clear articulation of structure and sensitively matched natural materials the center projects an aura of classical serenity

paul mellon s superb collection and other works of british art look splendid in the luminous interiors bathed in controlled amounts of natural or incandescent light amidst the muted tones of oak and linen travertine and concrete that discreetly and appropriately allow art to be the focus of attention this handsome volume originally published for the center s grand opening in 1977 is a timely reminder of the center s architectural distinction contemporaneous photographs and an enlightening essay by jules david prown provide an account of the architecture design and circumstances of its commission and building a new foreword by its current director amy meyers brings the celebration of the center into the present day jacket
