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psychologists regard the relationship between attitudes and behavior as a key to understanding human behavior here leading researchers discuss basic and applied issues relating to how human thought translates into action the contributors focus on the theory of planned behavior a model of attitude behavior relations that takes into account not just attitudes but also the influence of significant others around us issues of personal agency and motivation the book begins with an overview of the theory of planned behavior from the initial impetus to better understand attitude behavior relations through the theory of reasoned action to the theory of planned behavior among the applied issues discussed in subsequent chapters are using the model to predict homeless persons use of services understanding the motivation underpinning suicide in an at risk sample and experimentally manipulating antecedents of risky driving behavior more methodologically oriented chapters explore how the theory of planned behavior may be developed in the future several chapters discuss the potential integration of the theory of planned behavior with social identity theory and goal theory other chapters discuss the key components of the theory of planned behavior and whether the theory might usefully be extended with the concept of descriptive norms this book considers a full spectrum of important developments that enhance our understanding of the theory of planned behavior and efforts to extend it from applications to new avenues for research the chapters that make up this book address important issues surrounding theoretical and practical approaches to addressing problems in attitude behavior research

this book summarizes theoretical and empirical work that was performed in a large scale cross university research project on the relationship between attitudes and behavior the entire program has been funded by the deutsche forschungsgemeinschaft dfg an institution that operates similarly to the american national science foundation in 1981 the dfgruled to release the project for a five year period with the option to extend if th extension proposal would suggest a major alteration of research goals the participants are presently in the stage of transition between the first five year allotment and the granted extension we feel that this is the most opportune time to summarize the development of the project for an international audience until now only scattered publications have existed this book is more than just a compilation of previously published results rather it is the original contributions and a substantial share of newly published empirical results that guarantee an up to date exposition of the entire program the general goal of the research group is to perform basic research in attaining explanations for the relationships between attitude and behavior and to improve the predictability of current predictor models in pursuing this goal we are not primarily interested in the immediate strategy of redefining predictor variables within the framework of the general linear statistical model rather we emphasize cognitive processes and structures that predispose a person s behavior that accompany behavior or that change as a result of prior behavior

when going for grocery shopping some consumers make up their minds about what to buy and write down shopping lists others just go into the supermarket and do not really think beforehand about the things they need although in both situations individuals engage in different ways of decision making on the purchase of groceries when coming home and putting things into the shelf they positively or negatively assess the things they bought whereas in some situations one gets a positive feeling because e g s he purchased all the products on the shopping list in another situation a consumer might end up being bored because s he just bought the groceries which are perceived as useful and did not listen to his her inner voice calling for more than just the fulfillment of utilitarian needs generally consumers can consciously do their purchases and decide for products after thinking on it or can consider a product s attributes and let their intuition decide in the interest of the consumer the question emerges how the consumer decides at best does a consumer receive greater satisfaction from consciously elaborating about the products s he is facing or is it better not to think consciously when facing product choices this question is differently assessed by different models on decision making whereas some authors ajzen 2011 bandura 1986 1997 deci ryan 1985 payne et al 1993 emphasize consciousness in decision making there is also a large number of proponents of unconscious thought dijksterhuis 2004 dijksterhuis et al 2005 2006a 2006b 2006c levine 1996 bargh 2002 and wilson et al 1993 dijksterhuis and nordgren 2006b p 96 argue for the superiority of unconscious decision making by mentioning that conscious thought is constrained by the low capacity of consciousness which results in sub optimal choices with regard to food products this general superiority of unconscious thought is highly questionable on the one hand consumers constrain themselves in taking into account only specific products which respect certain criteria as e g with diabetics and food products with less sugar content on the other hand food products are also bought because consumers want to confirm their conscience by purchasing e g fair trade products which among other things are associated with a fair payment of farmers

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
