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in his assessment of the transformation of the roman world henri pirenne assigned little

significance to the sixth century seeing it primarily as a period of continuity in this volume twelve scholars assess the period in the light of new evidence and new perspectives the result is an infinitely complex picture covering scandinavia and central europe as well as the western mediterranean in which continuity and change exist side by side

in fourth to sixth century syria a nave platform known as the bema became popular in some regions before mysteriously disappearing this study seeks to explain how these bemata functioned and which elements led to their decline

asia minor is considered to have been a fairly prosperous region in late antiquity it was rarely disturbed by external invasions and remained largely untouched by the continuous roman persian conflict until very late in the period was apparently well connected to the flourishing mediterranean economy and as the region closest to constantinople is assumed to have played an important part in the provisioning of the imperial capital and the imperial armies when exactly this prosperity came to an end the late sixth century the early middle or even later seventh century remains a matter of debate likewise the impact of factors such as the dust veil event of 536 the impact of the bubonic plague that made its first appearance in ad 541 542 the costs and consequences of justinian s wars the persian attacks of the early seventh century and eventually the arab incursions of around the middle of the seventh century remains controversial the more general living conditions in both cities and countryside have long been neglected the majority of the population however did not live in urban but in rural contexts yet the countryside only found its proper place in regional overviews in the last two decades thanks to an increasing number of regional surveys in combination with a more refined pottery chronology our growing understanding of networks of villages and hamlets is very likely to influence the appreciation of the last decades of late antiquity drastically indeed it would seem that the sixth century in particular is characterized not only by a ruralization of cities but also by the extension and flourishing of villages in asia minor the roman near east and egypt this volume s series of themes include the physical development of large and small settlements their financial situation and the proportion of public and private investment imperial provincial and local initiatives in city and countryside are compared and the main motivations examined including civic or personal pride military incentives and religious stimuli the evidence presented will be used to form opinions on the impact of the plague on living circumstances in the sixth century and to evaluate the significance of the justinianic period

the twenty papers included in this volume were presented at an international symposium held in baltimore and washington in may 1986 planned to coincide with the exhibition of the two largest treasures of early byzantine church silver to survive from antiquity the kaper koraon treasure found in syria and the sion treasure found in turkey the symposium sought to place these and other church treasures in their broader contexts examining them from the point of view of economy history society and manufacture while a number of the papers focus on

specific aspects of these two treasures including six articles devoted to the sion treasure others examine more general questions regarding silver mining the manufacture of silver vessels the state control of silver in byzantium and the sasanian empire the economic and cultural role of silver objects and the financial power of the institutional church through its vast holdings of silver plate the precedent offered by pagan cult treasures is also examined to ensure a broad interdisciplinary approach the eighteen authors are authorities in the fields of government administration economic history cultural history art history archaeology epigraphy science and conservation

the volume contains a critical review of data results and open problems concerning the principal greek and coptic majuscule bookhands based on previous research of the author revised and updated to offer an overview of the different graphic phenomena although the various chapters address the history of different types of scripts i e biblical majuscule sloping poitend majuscule liturgical majuscule epigraphic and monumental scripts their juxtaposition allows us to identify common issues of the comparative method of palaeography from an overall critical assessment of these aspects the impossibility of applying a unique historical paradigm to interpret the formal expressions and the history of the different bookhands comes up due to the fact that each script follows different paths particular attention is also devoted to the use of greek majuscules in the writing of ancient christian books a modern and critical awareness of palaeographic method may help to place the individual witnesses in the context of the main graphic trends in the social and cultural environments in which they developed and in a more accurate chronological framework

sixteenth century philosophy was a unique synthesis of several philosophical frameworks a blend of old and new including but not limited to scholasticism humanism neo thomism aristotelianism and stoicism unlike most overviews of this period the routledge companion to sixteenth century philosophy does not simplify this colorful era by applying some traditional dichotomies such as the misleading line once drawn between scholasticism and humanism instead the companion closely covers an astonishingly diverse set of topics philosophical methodologies of the time the importance of the discovery of the new world the rise of classical scholarship trends in logic and logical theory nominalism averroism the jesuits the reformation neo stoicism the soul s immortality skepticism the philosophies of language and science and politics cosmology the nature of the understanding causality ethics freedom of the will natural law the emergence of the individual in society the nature of wisdom and the love of god throughout the companion seeks not to compartmentalize these philosophical matters but instead to show that close attention paid to their continuity may help reveal both the diversity and the profound coherence of the philosophies that emerged in the sixteenth century the companion s 27 chapters are published here for the first time and written by an international team of scholars and accessible for both students and researchers

the book examines the building mosaics objects and mosaic inscriptions found at the site of a sixth century monastery at beth shan the mosaic floors are described in particular detail with reference to comparable mosaics elsewhere in palestine translations are given of the inscriptions within the mosaics publications of the palestine section of the university museum university of pennsylvania vol iv

the arundell family of lanherne near newquay was one of the richest and most important in cornwall in the late middle ages having extensive property in most parts of the county as well as elsewhere notably devon and dorset cornwall record office has recently acquired the family archive and this provides the opportunity for publishing some of its rich contents as a first offering this volume contains rentals and surveys of the arundell lands incornwall from the fourteenth to the sixteenth centuries these documents list the lands and tenants of each property belonging to the family often in considerable detail the earliest survey is dated 1343 just before the black death and covers some of the arundell lands in the area of st columb major newquay and padstow the earliest full survey is for 1451 63 and includes those properties and others in the areas of the lizard penwith st austell bodmin and the clay country even then the family lands were still growing and in the sixteenth century are added further properties in south cornwall including one near looe and elsewhere these appear in the later documents published here these rentals and surveys provide much information about cornish history in general and in particular for local and family historians in cornwall for those interested in social and agricultural history manorial history place names and personal names there is an introduction covering some of the topics illustrated by the surveys and helping to make the material accessible to non specialists

at a time when each society had its own medium of propogation of its researches in the form of transactions proceedings journals etc a need was strongly felt for bringing out a journal devoted exclusively to the study and advancement of indian culture in all its aspects this encouraged jas burgess to launch the indian antiquary in 1872 the scope was in his own words as wide as possible incorporating manners and customs arts mythology feasts festivals and rites antiquities and the history of india another laudable aim was to present the readers abstracts of the most recent researches of scholars in india and the west indian antiquary also dealt with local legends folklore proverbs etc in short indian antiquary was entirely devoted to the study of man the indian in all spheres introduction to facsimile volumes published 1985

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
