in her latest contribution to the growing field of emotion studies deidre pribram makes a compelling argument for why culturalist approaches to the study of emotional disorders continue to be eschewed even as the sociocultural and historical study of mental illness flourishes the author ties this phenomenon to a tension between two fundamentally

different approaches to emotion an individualist approach which regards emotions as the property of the individual whether biologically or psychologically and a culturalist approach which regards emotions as collective social processes with distinctive histories and meanings that work to produce particularized subjects while she links a strong preference for the individualist construct in western culture to the rise of the psychological and psychiatric disciplines at the turn of the twentieth century pribram also engages with a diverse set of case studies tied to psychological and aesthetic discourses on emotions these range from van gogh s status as emotionally disordered to the public emotional aesthetics of 19th century melodrama to the diagnostic categories of the dsms and the fear of globalizing emotional disorders in the 21st century this genuinely interdisciplinary approach makes for a text with potential application in a wide range of disciplines within cultural studies including sociocultural and historical analysis of psychiatry and psychology gender theory subject and identity theory popular culture studies and history and theory of the arts

this text examines the pacific war the korean war and the vietnam war from the perspective of those who fought the wars and lived through them the relationship between history and memory informs the book and each war is relocated in the historical and cultural experiences of asian countries

foreign language lessons often provide translations into a foreign language of phrases students would normally use in their native language and cultural setting particularly when studying a non western language such direct translation is very misleading students must instead learn the conventions that guide human interactions so they know both what to say and how to say it in this text therefore the sociological context of javanese is explained as thoroughly as javanese grammar the book presents javanese in its full complexity and range in order to illustrate a cultural approach to a non western language it will therefore be of interest not only to language learners but to linguists sociologists anthropologists and many others

what role do language and discourse play in the advancement of peace what is the connection between a given society's peace language and the repeated failure of peace initiatives involving it at the heart of this book lie these basic questions and the attempt to shed light on them from new angles the book focuses on an analysis of israeli peace discourse and indicates the need for change in this discourse in order to promote a culture of peace it presents the process of peace estrangement a set of linguistic discursive and cultural devices intended for creating doubt regarding the positive meaning associated with the concept of peace the approach adopted in this book is the cultural approach to critical discourse analysis ccda this approach aims at exposing the cultural codes embedded in the discourse which contribute to reproducing abuses of social power the analytic chapters focus on different historical periods since the beginning of the 20th century to this day and deal with various genres found in diverse corpora such as knesset records and school textbooks

the volume written by the renowned historian caroline f ware investigates the impact that changes in society and culture that can influence the writing of history and the way in which the past is evaluated as louis adamic has pointed out it is to ellis island rather than to plymouth rock that a great part of the american people trace their history in america more people have died in industrial accidents than in subduing the wilderness and fighting the revolution it is these people rather than the frontiersmen who constitute the real historical background and the heroic tradition of the mass of urban americans the attempt to write american history from the bottom up started a generation ago with the study of the frontier it has recently extended into the study of local communities and culturally homogeneous regions in the still unexplored history of the non dominant cultural groups of the industrial cities lies the story of an emerging industrial culture that represents the dynamic cultural frontier of modern america

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an account of one of the most dominant trends in recent historical writing this book takes stock of the field even as it showcases exemplars of its practice taken together the essays present a broad picture of the state of american cultural historical scholarship

who governs is a central question in political science typically political scientists address this question by relying upon either empirical analysis which explains existing political practices or normative analysis which prescribes ideal political practices

when the big ball drops on new year s eve thousands are there to witness that great glittering sight while millions more watch on national television times square may be the cultural hub of america the crossroads of the world but its lights have not always shone as brightly as they do now once a glamorous theater district times square and 42nd street had degenerated into a neighborhood known for the winos and sex shops of midnight cowboy until new york s business and arts communities stepped in these advocates of urban revitalization exploited cultural and historic preservation arguments to transform a low income entertainment district into a disney fied tourist mecca where ratso rizzo once kicked cars and hookers plied their trade mickey mouse now greets visitors from atop a disney superstore surrounded by rising office towers theaters and theme restaurants all thanks to huge tax subsidies and government support alexander reichl tells the fascinating story of how cultural politics and economic greed transformed the city s physical and social environment with an ongoing multibillion dollar redevelopment program changing the district from a symbol of urban decline to one of urban renaissance he explains the political significance of the historic preservation and arts related approach to urban revitalization showing how it was used to appeal to the upscale values of middle class new yorkers often hostile to urban renewal he also examines the role of the walt disney company in the project and demonstrates its power to redefine a premier public space in telling the story of times square reichl reveals much about politics and power at the city level and their relationship to the development of urban space he frames his lively narrative with an illuminating account of how historic preservation initiatives at all government levels have displaced large scale federal urban renewal programs as the dominant approach to urban development

and he shows the importance of political discourse and cultural politics in mobilizing public support for urban redevelopment now that it has been reconfigured for the 21st century times square provides a rich and multifaceted case for exploring the latest trends in urban renewal yet reichl suggests much that has happened here is regrettable the ousting of low income citizens to serve commercial interests the loss of a culturally diverse entertainment district and the failure to address persistent class and race based segregation in a central urban area by getting to the heart of the great white way reconstructing times square provides an important look at urban renewal and politics in a changing america

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
