death in england provides the first ever social history of death from the earliest times 500 000 bc to diana princess of wales the book reveals how attitudes practices and beliefs about death have undergone constant change how why and at what ages people died plagues and violence wills and deathbeds funerals and memorials beliefs and bereavement richly illustrated striking and often very powerful images in time with the spirit of the age and coming millenium key scholars in their field write on their respective periods with the recent upturn of popular interest in death through films tv books and newspapers this book will prove stimulating to the general reader to students of archaeology art history medicine and sociology

as humans death its certainty its inevitability consumes us we make it the subject of our literature our art our philosophy and our religion our feelings and attitudes toward our mortality and its possible afterlives have evolved greatly from the early days of mankind collecting these views in this topical and instructive book w m spellman considers death and dying from every angle in the western tradition exploring how humans understand and come to terms with the end of life using the work of archaeologists and paleoanthropologists spellman examines how interpreting physical remains gives us insight into prehistoric perspectives on death he traces how humans have died over the centuries both in the causes of death and in the views of actions that lead to death he spotlights the great philosophical and scientific traditions of the west which did not believe in an afterlife or see the purpose of bereavement while also casting new light on the major religious beliefs that emerged in the ancient world particularly the centuries long development of christianity he delves into three approaches to the meaning of death the negation of life continuity in another form and agnosticism from both religious and secular scientific perspectives providing a deeper context for contemporary debates over end of life issues and the tension between longevity and quality of life a brief history of death is an illuminating look at the complex ways humans face death and the dying

how has our understanding of death evolved over the course of 2 500 years what can recorded history tell us about how different cultures and societies have felt about experienced responded to and marked the occasion of death across different periods and lands these are the questions pursued by 54 experts in this landmark work that explores the way past societies thought behaved and developed as they wrestled with enormity of their own mortality the volumes draw on history anthropology and cultural studies to carve a complete picture of death its symbols and interpretations from antiquity to the present day individual editors ensure volumes are cohesive and chapter titles are also identical across the volumes this gives the choice of reading about a specific period in one of the volumes or tracing a theme across history by reading the relevant chapter in each of the six

pattern of gradually developing evolutionary stages in our perceptions of life in relation to death each stage representing a virtual redefinition of human nature starting at the very foundations of western culture the eminent historian phillipe ari s shows how from graeco roman times through the first ten centuries of the common era death was too common to be frightening each life was quietly subordinated to the community which paid its respects and then moved on ari s identifies the first major shift in attitude with the turn of the eleventh century when a sense of individuality began to rise and with it profound consequences death no longer meant merely the weakening of community but rather the destruction of self hence the growing fear of the afterlife new conceptions of the last judgment and the first attempts by masses and other rituals to guarantee a better life in the next world in the 1500s attention shifted from the demise of the self to that of the loved one as family supplants community and by the nineteenth century death comes to be viewed as simply a staging post toward reunion in the hereafter finally ari s shows why death has become such an unendurable truth in our own century how it has been nearly banished from our daily lives and points out what may be done to re tame this secret terror the richness of ari s s source material and investigative work is breathtaking while exploring everything from churches religious rituals and graveyards with their often macabre headstones and monuments to wills and testaments love letters literature paintings diaries town plans crime and sanitation reports and grave robbing complaints aries ranges across europe to russia on the one hand and to england and america on the other as he sorts out the tangled mysteries of our accumulated terrors and beliefs we come to understand the history indeed the pathology of our intellectual and psychological tensions in the face of death

death is universal but each culture has found a different way to deal with it this wide ranging book examines the compelling subject of death funeral rites and burial in different cultures and societies and balances grim facts with intriguing details drawn from many cultures and epochs revealing how we define our lives through our passing

the routledge history of death since 1800 looks at how death has been treated and dealt with in modern history the history of the past 250 years in a global context through a mix of definite often quantifiable changes and a complex qualitative assessment of the subject the book is divided into three parts with the first considering major trends in death history and identifying widespread patterns of change and continuity in the material and cultural features of death since 1800 the second part turns to specifically regional experiences and the third offers more specialized chapters on key topics in the modern history of death

throughout the centuries different cultures have established a variety of procedures for handling and disposing of corpses often the methods are directly associated with the deceased's position in life such as a pharaoh's mummification in egypt or the cremation of a buddhist treatment by the living of the dead over time and across cultures is the focus of this study burial arrangements and preparations are detailed including embalming the funeral service storage and transport of the body and forms of burial autopsies and the investigative process of causes of deliberate death are fully covered preservation techniques such as cryonic suspension and mummification are discussed as well as a look at the recycling of the corpse through organ donation donation to medicine animal scavengers cannibalism and of course natural decay and decomposition mistreatments of a corpse are also covered

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charts the history of death from the earliest known humans in england to the close of the 20th century although there have been many important books on death concentrating on different topics and eras this is the first time that the whole history of english england only not the entire british isles death has been mapped out the chronology of half a million years has been arranged into 10 chapters to allow each author scope to explore changes continuities and contrasts within their individual periods this book explores how real people s deaths and the arrangements made in response to them have changed over the millennia the strong visual record of death often created in commemoration provides the illustrations over 140 b w plates

although tradition has not informed us whether our first parents made any marked change in their scanty garments on the death of their near relatives it is certain that the fashion of wearing mourning and the institution of funereal ceremonies and rites are of the most remote antiquity herodotus tells us that the egyptians over 3 000 years ago selected yellow as the colour which denoted that a kinsman was lately deceased they moreover shaved their eyebrows when a relative died but the death of a dog or a cat regarded as divinities by this curious people was a matter of much greater importance to them for then they not only shaved their eyebrows but every hair on their bodies was plucked out and doubtless this explains the reason why so many elaborate wigs are to be seen in the various museums devoted to egyptian antiquities it would require a volume to give an idea of the singular funereal ceremonials of this people with whom death was regarded so to speak as a speciality for their religion was mainly devoted to the cultus of the departed and consequently innumerable monumental tombs still exist all over egypt the majority of which are full of mummies whose painted cases are most artistic the cat was worshipped as a divinity by the egyptians magnificent tombs were erected in its honour sacrifices and devotions were offered to it and as has already been said it was customary for the people of the house to shave their heads and eyebrows whenever pussy departed the family circle possibly it was their exalted position in egypt which eventually led to cats being considered the familiars of witches in the middle ages and even in our own time for belief in witchcraft is not extinct the kindly egyptians made mummies of their cats and dogs and it is presumable that since egypt is a corn growing and hence a rat and mouse producing country both dogs and cats as killers of these vermin were regarded with extreme veneration on account of their exterminating qualities their mummies are often both curious and comical for the poor beast s quaint figure and face are frequently preserved with an indescribably grim realism after the lapse of many ages
