entertaining an audience Choose songs that are both musically engaging and enjoyable to listen to II Structuring the Concert Program A wellstructured program keeps the audience engaged and prevents the concert from dragging Heres a suggested format Opening Begin with a highenergy crowdpleasing piece to immediately capture the audiences attention This could be a rousing carol or a vibrant instrumental piece Variety Act Intersperse various performance styles throughout the concert Include vocal solos instrumental pieces piano violin flute percussion ensembles choral pieces and potentially even dance or dramatic interludes Building Momentum Gradually increase the complexity and intensity of the performances as the concert progresses Save your most impactful piece for near the end Audience Participation Incorporate opportunities for audience participation This could be singing along to familiar carols joining in a simple callandresponse or even a brief QA with the performers Grand Finale End with a powerful and memorable piece that leaves the audience feeling uplifted and satisfied Consider a full choir performance of a wellloved carol or a medley of popular Christmas songs III Practical Considerations Successful execution requires careful planning beyond just musical selections Rehearsal Schedule Establish a realistic rehearsal schedule that allows sufficient time for practice without overwhelming the children Regular shorter rehearsals are often more effective than infrequent lengthy ones Costumes and Props Simple festive costumes can enhance the visual appeal of the concert Props should be functional and easily managed by the young performers Sound and Lighting Ensure adequate sound amplification and appropriate lighting to create the desired atmosphere A simple lighting setup can dramatically enhance the stage presence Staging and Choreography Simple staging and minimal choreography can greatly enhance the performances especially for younger children Avoid anything overly complicated or potentially dangerous Program and Tickets Design an attractive program and create a system for ticket sales or donations IV Engaging the Audience A captivating performance relies not only on the musical quality but also on the performers engagement with the audience Stage Presence Encourage children to maintain eye contact smile and project their voices Practice confident posture and movement Storytelling Weave narratives into the performance to add context and depth to the musical selections Interaction Incorporate interactive elements such as asking questions or inviting audience participation Visual Aids Use simple visuals such as projected images or props to enhance the storytelling and create a more immersive

the public outcry for a return to moral education in our schools has raised more dust than it s dispelled building upon his provocative ideas in on becoming responsible michael pritchard clears the air with a sensible plan for promoting our children s moral education through the teaching of reasonableness pritchard contends that children have a definite but frequently untapped capacity for reasonableness and that schools in a democratic society must make the nurturing of that capacity one of their primary aims as fundamental to learning as the development of reading writing and math skills reasonableness itself he shows can be best cultivated through the practice of philosophical inquiry within a classroom community in such an environment children learn to work together to listen to one

another to build on one another's ideas to probe assumptions and different perspectives and ultimately to think for themselves advocating approaches to moral education that avoid mindless indoctrination and timid relativism. Pritchard neither preaches nor hides behind abstractions; he makes liberal use of actual classroom dialogues to illustrate children's remarkable capacity to engage in reasonable conversation about moral concepts involving fairness, cheating, loyalty, truth-telling, lying, making and keeping promises, obedience, character, and responsibility. He also links such discussions to fundamental concerns over law and moral authority, the roles of teachers and parents, and the relationship between church and state. Pritchard draws broadly and deeply from the fields of philosophy and psychology as well as from his own extensive personal experience working with children and teachers. The result is a rich and insightful work that provides real hope for the future of our children and their moral education.

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
