church history in plain language makes church history clear memorable and accessible to every reader dr bruce shelley makes church history come alive in this classic book that has become not only the first choice of many laypeople and church leaders but the standard text in many college classrooms church history in plain language treats history as the story of people their motivations the issues they grapple with the decisions they make and the result is that history reads like a story almost as dramatic and moving as a novel this fourth edition revised by r l hatchett brings the story of christianity into the twenty first century with detailed information on theology of the early church and reformation gnosticism and its ongoing relevance the rapid global

extension and transformation of christianity since 1900 the decline in traditional mainline denominations the influence of technology on the spread of the gospel how christianity intersects with other religions in countries all over the world church history in plain language makes history easy to follow and retain by dividing the christian story into the great ages of the church its clarity organization and historical accuracy are part of what make this book a go to resource for today s readers

over the past few years interest and research in experimental linguistics has shifted more toward centre stage perhaps because of the growing recognition that purely theoretical formulations and speculations about language must necessarily be tested against the empirical facts of language knowledge use and acquisition to highlight some aspects of empirical linguistics a conference was organized in 1978 at university of alberta at which six prominent scholars were invited to present substantial contributions these papers are included in this volume together with an epilogue summing up and discussing the recurrent themes of the conference and a general bibliography

number is the most underestimated of the grammatical categories it is deceptively simple yet the number system which philosophers logicians and many linguists take as the norm namely the distinction between singular and plural as in cat versus cats is only one of a wide range of possibilities to be found in languages around the world some languages for instance make more distinctions than english having three four or even five different values adopting a wide ranging perspective greville corbett draws on examples from many languages to analyse the possible systems of number he reveals that the means for signalling number are remarkably varied and are put to a surprising range of special additional uses by surveying some of the riches of the world s linguistic resources this book first published in 2000 makes a major contribution to the typology of categories and demonstrates that languages are much more varied than is generally recognised
