Franz Boas 1858-1942 Boas considered the father of American anthropology championed cultural relativism the idea that cultures should be understood on their own terms not judged against external standards His work particularly *Race Language and Culture* 1940 challenged racist ideologies prevalent at the time by emphasizing the diversity and dynamism of human cultures

Argonauts of the Western Pacific 1922 his study of the Kula ring exchange system in the Trobriand Islands exemplifies this approach

Margaret Mead 1901-1978 Meads groundbreaking work including *Coming of Age in Samoa* 1928 explored the impact of culture on human development While some of her findings have been debated her work remains influential in highlighting the cultural variability of 2 human experience and challenging universalist perspectives

Claude LviStrauss 1908-2009 LviStrauss a key figure
