in 1877 ruskin accused whistler of flinging a pot of paint in the public s face was he right after all whistler always denied that the true function of art was to represent anything if a painting does not represent what is it other than mere paint flung in the public s face whistler s answer was simple painting is music or it is poetry georges braque half a century later echoed whistler s answer so did braque s friends apollinaire and ponge they presented their poetry as music too and as painting but meanwhile composers such as satie and stravinsky were presenting their own art music as if it transposed the values of painting or of poetry the fundamental principle of this intermedial aesthetic which bound together an extraordinary fraternity of artists in all media in paris from 1885 to 1945 was this we must always think about the value of a work of art not within the logic of its own medium but as if it transposed the value of art in another medium peter dayan traces the history of this principle how it created our very notion of great art why it declined as a vision from the 1960s and how in the 21st century it is fighting back

sounding the gallery argues that early video art is an audiovisual genre the new video technology not only enabled artists to sound their visual work and composers to visualise their music during the 1960s it also initiated a spatial form of engagement that encouraged new relationships between art music practices and their audiences

the traditional musics of china japan and korea have been an important source of inspiration for many western composers some like chou wen chung and john cage have moved beyond superficial borrowing of eastern musical elements in earnest attempts to understand non western principles of composition at the same time many asian composers often trained in the west or in western music traditions have been using asian elements to create works of unique musical synthesis as a result of such cultural interpenetrations the landscape of western art music has been irreversably altered locating east asia in western art music is a comparative study of asian influenced western composers and western influenced asian composers and the first sustained exploration of this cross cultural exchange bringing together work by music theorists musicologists and ethnomusicologists this book explores how musical notions of east and west are constructed and utilized by composers and reevaluates the many ways east asian composers have contributed to developments in

since the late 1980s the boundaries between the musicologies have become increasingly blurred most notably a growing number of musicologists have become interested in the ideas and methodologies of ethnomusicology and in particular in applying one of the central methodological tools of ethnomusicology ethnography to the study of western art music a tradition which had previously been studied primarily through scores recordings and other historical sources alongside this since the 1970s a small number of ethnomusicologists have also written about western art music thus complicating the idea of ethnomusicology as the study of other music indeed there has been a growth in this area of scholarship in recent years approaching western art music through the perspectives of ethnomusicology can offer new and enriching insights to the study of this musical tradition as shown in the writings presented in this book the current volume is the first collection of essays on this topic and includes work by authors from a range of musicological and ethnomusicological backgrounds exploring a variety of issues including music in orchestral outreach programmes new audiences for classical music concerts music and conflict transformation ethnographic study of the rehearsal process and the politics of a high profile music festival this book was originally published as a special issue of ethnomusicology forum

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
