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the hero s journey a quest that leads to self discovery has been central to literature since the earliest epics covering the role of the hero s journey in beowulf the lord of the rings moby dick and to kill a mockingbird the hero s journey contains about 20 original and reprinted essays and critical analyses that discuss the role of the title s subject theme in a great work of literature

unlimited players provides writing center scholars with new approaches to engaging with multimodality in the writing center through the lenses of games play and digital literacies considering how game scholarship can productively deepen existing writing center conversations regarding the role of creativity play and engagement this book helps practitioners approach a variety of practices such as starting new writing centers engaging tutors and writers developing tutor education programs developing new ways to approach multimodal and digital

compositions brought to the writing center and engaging with ongoing scholarly conversations in the field the collection opens with theoretically driven chapters that approach writing center work through the lens of games and play these chapters cover a range of topics including considerations of identity empathy and power productive language play during tutoring sessions and writing center heuristics the last section of the book includes games written in the form of tabletop game directions that directors can use for staff development or tutors can play with writers to help them develop their skills and practices no other text offers a theoretical and practical approach to theorizing and using games in the writing center unlimited players provides a new perspective on the long standing challenges facing writing center scholars and offers insight into the complex questions raised in issues of multimodality emerging technologies tutor education identity construction and many more it will be significant to writing center directors and administrators and those who teach tutor training courses

an examination of sixteenth century quest narratives focussing on their conscious use of a medieval tradition to hold a mirror up to contemporary culture offers the first full study of the allegorical knightly quest tradition from the middle ages to the renaissance richly satisfying as impressive in the detail of its scholarship as in the elegance of its critical formulations it seamlessly moves between different literary traditions and across conventional period boundaries in dr nievergelt s treatment of this theme the successive retellings of the tale of the knight s quest come to stand as an emblem of shifting values and norms both religious and worldly and of our repeated failures to realise those ideals dr alex davis department of english university of st andrews the literary motif of the allegorical knightly quest appears repeatedly in the literature of the late medieval early modern period notably in spenser but has hitherto been little examined here in his examination of a number of sixteenth century english allegorical chivalric quest narratives focussing on spenser s faerie queene but including important lesser known works such as stephen bateman s travayled pylgrime and william goodyear s voyage of the wandering knight the author argues that the tradition begins with the french writer guillaume de deguileville his seminal pèlerinage de la vie humaine was composed c 1331 1355 it was widely adapted translated rewritten and printed over the next centuries dr nievergelt goes on to demonstrate how this essentially medieval literary form could be adapted to articulate reflections on changing patterns of identity society and religion during the early modern period and how it becomes a vehicle of self exploration and self fashioning during a period of profound cultural crisis dr marco nievergelt is lecturer maître assistant and snf swiss national science foundation research fellow in the english department at the universit  de lausanne

this study reconsiders the vulgate cycle and the functional interrelation of prophecy and epistemological critique in thirteenth century grail literature no mere prediction prophecy marks a critical strategy by which the nature and limits of knowledge are put into systematic question

based on the author s thesis part i was previously published in 1940 by the american museum of natural history this revised edition includes two additional comparative sections

dangerous shallows tells the story of a quest to solve maritime cold cases the odyssey takes the reader along for a moment by moment look at the events surrounding the loss of more than twenty different ships and includes the stories of discovering their wrecks and learning about the final hours of each of these ships

this book uses a nine year experience of teaching world mythology to art students in order to discuss why and how such ancient stories provide significance today myth s weird images and metaphors recall wyrd word the goddess of the cauldron students can be guided into the cauldron of mythic language to feel the stirring of new awareness of what it really means to be human psychologically myth offers insights into family relations memory imagination and otherness ecological insights from myth teach the connection among human animal plant relations and the organicism of all life forms cosmological insights from myth surprisingly echo findings in new science with its emphasis on quantum mechanics force fields black holes subatomic particles chaos and the possibilities of time travel two areas often considered completely opposite myth and science actually reflect one another since both propose theories albeit in different ways myth cannot be laughed away as mere fabula since like science and psychology it has long explored adventures into unseen unknown worlds that yield necessary knowledge about the place of humans in the scheme of things big and small the more of myth will be of interest to teachers and students of curriculum studies to those seeking to go beyond oedipus and gutenbergs and to readers who know that all forms of life including fingernails and rocks are wondrous diverse alive capable purposive and necessary

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
