The Intertwined Histories of Queerness and Disability

Historically both queer and disabled individuals have faced similar forms of social stigma 2 medicalization and exclusion

Both groups have been subjected to forced institutionalization sterilization and the denial of basic human rights

This shared history fosters a powerful alliance emphasizing the need for solidarity and collaborative action

The medical model for example has historically sought to cure or normalize both queer and disabled bodies

This medical gaze often involves invasive procedures therapies aimed at conformity and a dismissal of diverse experiences as deviations from a supposedly normal standard

individuals have been rendered invisible or represented in stereotypical and dehumanizing ways within mainstream media and popular culture. 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in multiple locations activists and scholars are mapping the intersections of queer theory and disability studies moving issues of embodiment and desire to the center of cultural and political analyses the two fields are premised on the idea that the categories of heterosexual homosexual and able bodied disabled are historically and socially

mcruer makes a case that queer and disabled identities politics and cultural logics are inexorably intertwined and that queer and disability theory need one another crip theory makes clear that no cultural analysis is complete without attention to the politics of bodily ability and alternative corporealities

stories of the people who brought both into modern consciousness they represent vital landmarks in the little explored intersections between the two groups past and present turn of the century mexican bisexual painter frida kahlo was disabled by both polio and injury michelangelo turned his artistic talents toward homoerotic poetry to manage his arthritis the iconic marsha p johnson lived with and cared for those with aids and dr fryer the psychiatrist with depression has been credited with planting the seed that led to the removal of homosexuality from the american diagnostic manual of mental disorders while many of these events seem small they shape our queer and disability cultures and shared history to show just how far we ve come and how far we still have to go

amputation need not always signify castration indeed in jack london's fiction losing a limb becomes part of a process through which queerly gendered men become properly masculinized in her astute book vulnerable constitutions cynthia barounis explores the way american writers have fashioned alternative even resistant epistemologies of queerness disability and masculinity she seeks to understand the way perverse sexuality physical damage and bodily contamination have stimulated rather than created a crisis for masculine characters in twentieth and early twenty first century literature barounis introduces the concept of anti prophylactic citizenship a mode of political belonging characterized by vulnerability receptivity and risk to examine counternarratives of american masculinity investigating the work of authors including london william faulkner james baldwin and eli clare she presents an evolving narrative of medicalized sexuality and anti prophylactic masculinity her literary readings interweave queer theory disability

studies and the history of medicine to demonstrate how evolving scientific conversations around deviant genders and sexualities gave rise to a new model of national belonging ultimately rewriting the story of american masculinity as a story of queer crip rebellion

bringing together work from both disability studies and irish studies this book argues that the idea of ireland was constructed and developed in the long 19th century through notions of physical and cognitive difference

this dissertation examines the intersection of disability with race and gender in texts that seek to reconfigure or critique nationalism previous disability scholarship on the nation has viewed the nation as a concept predicated on the able body coinciding with feminist and anti racist critiques positing nationalism as a construct grounded in relations of domination in contrast this project asks what happens when cultural workers aligning themselves with liberatory social movements such as feminism the chicana o movement or struggles against globalization and in favor of democratization reexamine nationalism and citizenship through representations of disability it argues that although the reformulated nationalisms and transnational subjectivities presented in these texts do not always evade the problems associated with the idea of the nation notably its exclusionary constructions of citizenship there are nonetheless important ethical epistemological and political implications in the acts of claiming disability and of producing cultural texts that seek to construct communities based on that claim

this book examines disability in the context of two areas subjectivity and sexuality in which it has been hitherto suppressed using feminist and postmodernist analysis margrit shildrick explores what motivates the discrimination devaluation and alienation directed at disabled people and argues that the difference that disability encapsulates uncovers a psycho cultural imaginary that sustains modernist understandings of what constitutes an embodied subject where autonomy is the most valued attribute of subjectivity any compromise of bodily control indication of connectivity or of corporeal instability mobilizes a deep seated anxiety in the normative majority that is most acute in relation to disability and sexuality by critiquing conventional paradigms this study shows how it
