this comprehensive collection comprising 28 contributors provides an innovative comparison between economic and financial integration in europe and latin america it is a valuable overview focusing on three topics regional integration and monetary co operation in europe and latin america exchange rate strategies and financial sector structure

there is mounting empirical evidence that the responsible provision and use of formal financial services have a positive impact on household well being and enterprise performance at the individual level financial inclusion benefits rural households and small producers by facilitating the safe accumulation of assets enabling them to leverage those assets in order to invest in human and physical capital and supporting better risk management the positive effects at the aggregate level are associated with better allocation of scarce resources among different activities despite recent progress on different aspects of financial inclusion in latin america and the caribbean large gaps remain especially in rural areas which have been historically neglected by traditional providers of financial services this book describes how these gaps have evolved recently in five countries costa rica the dominican republic el salvador honduras and mexico that are at different stages of designing and implementing comprehensive financial inclusion strategies then on the basis of a comparative analysis of the institutional architecture available it identifies the main barriers preventing small rural producers from accessing and making effective use of the various financial services on offer with a view to making policy recommendations for overcoming these limitations

in 2007 latin american and caribbean region was confronted with a worsening external financial situation caused by a high level of volatility in international financial markets and rising uncertainty both largely the result of the crisis originating in the united states financial market though economies continued to grow this annual

publication includes official country figures and an analysis of developments in the region's economy in 2007 and projections for 2008 it covers primary economic indicators such as gross domestic product gdp inflation imports exports and unemployment key economic trends are identified and their causes are explained

this publication sets out and analyses the main foreign direct investment fdi trends in the countries of latin america and the caribbean the 2017 edition shows that the region is at a difficult juncture fdi inflows declined by 7.9 in 2016 to us 167 043 billion representing a cumulative fall of 17.0 since the peak in 2011 the fall in commodity prices continues to affect investments in natural resources sluggish economic growth in several countries has slowed the flow of market seeking capital and the global backdrop of technological sophistication and expansion of the digital economy has concentrated transnational investments in developed economies

the 2017 edition of the economic survey of latin america and the caribbean has three parts part i outlines the region's economic performance in 2016 and analyses trends in the early months of 2017 as well as the outlook for the rest of the year it examines external and domestic factors that have influenced the region's economic performance and draws attention to macroeconomic policy challenges part ii analyses the characteristics of the current economic cycle in the region 2009-2016 and contrasts it with the two preceding cycles 1990-2001 and 2002-2008 it also identifies and attempts to explain some of the determinants of the cycle and outlines possible strategies for regaining growth part iii contains notes relating to the economic performance of countries of the region

the economic survey is one of eclac's flagship publications and has been issued since 1948 this new edition covers the region's economic performance in 2007 and the first semester of 2008 and suggests growth estimates for this year

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
