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the avant garde movements of dada and surrealism continue to have a huge influence on cultural practice especially in contemporary art with its obsession with sexuality fetishism and shock tactics in this new treatment of the subject hopkins focuses on the many debates surrounding these movements the marquis de sade's surrealist deification issues of quality how good is dali the idea of the readymade attitudes towards the city the impact of freud attitudes to women fetishism and primitivism the international nature of these movements is examined covering the cities of zurich new york berlin cologne barcelona paris london and recently discovered examples in eastern europe hopkins explores the huge range of media employed by both dada and surrealism collage painting found objects performance art photography film whilst at the same time establishing the aesthetic differences between the movements he also examines the dadaist obsession with the body as mechanism in relation to the surrealists return to the fetishized

the art of robert rauschenberg 1925 2008 is usually viewed as quite distinct from surrealism a movement which the artist himself displayed some hostility towards however rauschenberg had a very positive reception among surrealists particularly across the period 1959 69 in the face of rauschenberg s avowals of his own literalism and insistence on his art as facts this book gathers generous evidence of the poetic metaphorical allusive associative and connotative dimensions of the artist s oeuvre as identified by surrealists and thus extrapolates new readings from rauschenberg s key works on that basis by viewing rauschenberg s art against the expansion of the cultural influence of the united states in europe in the period after the second world war and the increasingly politicized activities of the surrealists in the era of the algerian war of independence 1954 62 robert rauschenberg and surrealism shows how poetic inference of the artist s work was turned towards political interpretation by analysing rauschenberg s art in the context of surrealism and drawing from it new interpretations and perspectives this volume simultaneously situates the surrealist movement in 1960s american art criticism and history

in 1972 angela carter translated xavire gauthier s ground breaking feminist critique of the surrealist movement surrealisme et sexualit 1971 although the translation was never published the project at once confirmed and consolidated carter s previous interest in surrealism representation gender and desire and aided her formulation of a new surrealist feminist aesthetic carter s sustained engagement with surrealist aesthetics and politics as well as surrealist scholarship aptly demonstrates what is at stake for feminism at the intersection of avant garde aesthetics and the representation of women and female desire drawing on previously unexplored archival material such as typescripts journals and letters anna watz s study is the first to trace the full

extent to which carter's writing was influenced by the surrealist movement and its critical heritage watz's book is an important contribution to scholarship on angela carter as well as to contemporary feminist debates on surrealism and will appeal to scholars across the fields of contemporary british fiction feminism and literary and visual surrealism

surrealism is a survey of the twentieth century's longest lasting and arguably most influential art movement championed and held together by andre breton for over forty years surrealism was france's major avant garde artistic tendency from 1924 onwards rapidly spreading around the globe to become an international phenomenon during world war ii surrealism's exiled artists and writers had a major impact on american art and were a primary influence for the abstract expressionist generation the official surrealist movement continued to the end of breton's life in 1966 and its legacy is still pervasive today in contemporary art as well as in numerous quotations from surrealist imagery in cinema advertising and the media the survey essay by mary ann caws a distinguished scholar translator and associate of the surrealists describes in clear perceptive and lively prose the essential characteristics that define surrealism as well as tracing a concise path through the chronology of this prolific and wide ranging movement the text also demonstrates how surrealist art and writing are interdependent the works section follows the movement from its beginnings in the 1920s up to the 1940s and 1950s its six sections trace the themes which predominated at different stages chance and freedom the earliest work characterized by complete automatic spontaneity poetics of vision the strategies of surrealist image making reflecting the mind's inner visions elusive objects the fascination with objects of all kinds from which emerged artworks such as meret oppenheim's celebrated fur lined cup and saucer desire the investigation of desire eroticism and mad love which is central and unique to the movement delirium surrealism's high risk engagement with extreme mental states and disturbing uncanny visions and the infinite terrains of later surrealism ranging from joseph cornell's magical assemblages in box frames like theatres of the mind to the infinite fields and dynamic energy of late surrealist painting at the dawn of abstract expressionism

the marquis de sade 1740 1814 was one of the key figures identified by andré breton in his surrealist manifestos as inspirational to the whole surrealist movement sade's importance to the surrealists and their close affiliates is reflected in the sheer volume of their art and writing dedicated to or inspired by his life philosophy and work sadism and surrealism is a detailed essay which documents this body of work in terms of both art and literature

in addition to its more well known literary and artistic origins the french surrealist movement drew inspiration from currents of psychological anxiety and rebellion running through a shadowy side of mass culture specifically in fantastic popular fiction and sensationalistic journalism the provocative nature of this insolent mass culture resonated with the intellectual and political preoccupations of the surrealists as robin walz demonstrates in this fascinating study pulp surrealism weaves an interpretative history of the intersection between mass print culture and surrealism re evaluating both our understanding of mass culture in early twentieth century paris and the revolutionary aims of the surrealist movement pulp surrealism presents four case studies each exploring the out of the way and impudent elements which inspired the surrealists walz discusses louis aragon's *le paysan de paris* one of the great surrealist novels of paris he goes on to consider the popular series of fantômes crime novels the parisian press coverage of the arrest trial and execution of mass murderer landru and the surrealist inquiry is suicide a solution which walz juxtaposes with reprints of actual suicide faits divers sensationalist newspaper blurbs although surrealist interest in sensationalist popular culture eventually waned this exploration of mass print culture as one of the cultural milieux from which surrealism emerged ultimately calls into question assumptions about the avant garde origins of modernism itself

tracing the movement from its origins in the 1920s to its decline in the 1950s and 1960s durozoi tells the history of surrealism through its activities publications and reviews demonstrating its close ties to some of the most explosive political as well as creative debates of the twentieth century unlike other histories which focus mainly on the pre world war ii years of the movement in paris durozoi covers both a wider chronological and geographic range treating in detail the postwar years and surrealism's colonization of latin america the united states japan czechoslovakia belgium italy and north africa drawing on documentary and visual evidence including 1 000 photos many of them in color he illuminates all the intellectual and artistic aspects of the movement from literature and philosophy to painting photography and film all the surrealist stars and their most important works are here aragon borges breton buñuel cocteau crevel dalí desnos ernst man ray soupault and many more for all of whom durozoi has provided brief biographical notes in addition to featuring them in the main text

an interrogation of the notion of space in surrealist theory and philosophy this study analyzes the manifestations of space in the paintings and writings done in the framework of the surrealist movement haim finkelstein introduces the screen as an important spatial paradigm that clarifies and extends the understanding of surrealism as it unfolds in the 1920s exploring the screen and layered depth as fundamental structuring principles associated with the representation of the mental space and of the internal processes that eventually came to be linked with the surrealist concept of psychic automatism extending the discussion of the concepts at stake for surrealist visual art into the context of film literature and criticism this study sheds new light on the way film thinking permeates surrealist thought and aesthetics in early chapters finkelstein looks at the concept of the screen as emblematic of a strand of spatial apprehension that informs the work of young writers in the 1920s such as robert desnos and louis aragon he goes on to explore the way the spatial character of the serial films of louis feuillade intimated to the surrealists a related mode of vision associated with perception of the mystery and the marvelous lurking behind the surfaces of quotidian reality the dialectics informing surrealist thought with regard to the surfaces of the real with walls doors and windows as controlling images are shown to be at the basis of andr retton s notion of the picture as a window contrary to the traditional sense of this metaphor breton s window is informed by the screen paradigm with its surface serving as a locus of a dialectics of transparency and opacity permeability and reflectivity the main aesthetic and conceptual issues that come up in the consideration of breton s window metaphor lay the groundwork for an analysis of the work of giorgio de chirico ren agritte max ernst andr assion and joan mir he concluding chapter consi

at first glance sufism and surrealism appear to be as far removed from one another as is possible adonis however draws convincing parallels between the two contesting that god in the traditional sense does not exist in surrealism or in sufism and that both are engaged in parallel quests for the nature of the absolute through holy madness and the deregulation of the senses this is a remarkable investigation into the common threads of thought that run through seemingly polarised philosophies from east and west written by a man edward said referred to as the most eloquent spokesman and explorer of arab modernity

in the thick of the second world war the cairo based surrealist collective art et liberte were pioneering new art forms and mounting subversive exhibitions that sent shockwaves across local artistic circles born with the publication of their manifesto long live degenerate art on december 22nd 1938 the group rejected the convergence of art and nationalism aligning themselves with a complex international and evolving surrealist movement spanning cities such as paris london mexico city new york beirut and tokyo art and liberty created a distinct reworking of surrealism which provided a generation of disillusioned egyptian and non egyptian artists and writers men and women alike with a platform for cultural reform and anti fascist protest surrealism in egypt is the first comprehensive analysis of art and liberty s artworks literature and critical writings on surrealism by addressing the group s long lost and often misconstrued legacy and drawing on a substantial body of previously unpublished primary documents and more than 200 field interviews the author charts art and liberty s significant contribution towards a new definition of surrealism moving beyond the polarizing dichotomies of
