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still remarkably vivid it is easier to read this for pure pleasure than just about any other ancient text nicholas lezard guardian ovid's sensuous and witty poem begins with the creation of the world and brings together a dazzling array of mythological tales ingeniously linked by the idea of transformation often as a result of love or lust where men and women find themselves magically changed into extraordinary new beings including the well known stories of daedalus and icarus pyramus and thisbe pygmalion perseus and andromeda and the fall of troy the metamorphoses has influenced writers and artists from shakespeare and chaucer to picasso and ted hughes this translation by david raeburn is in hexameter verse which brilliantly captures the energy and spontaneity of the original translated by david raeburn with an introduction by denis feeney

printers in the early modern low countries produced no fewer than 152 editions of ovid's metamorphoses john tholen investigates what these editions can tell us about the early modern application of the popular ancient text analysis of paratexts shows for example how editors and commentators guide readers to ovid's potentially subversive contents paratextual infrastructures intended to create commercial credibility but simultaneously were a response to criticism of reading the metamorphoses this book combines two often separated fields of research book history and reception studies it provides a compelling case study of how investigation into the material contexts of ancient texts sheds new light on early modern receptions of antiquity

why has the myth of pygmalion and his ivory statue proved so inspirational for writers artists philosophers scientists and directors and creators of films and television series

the authorised version of the story appears in the epic poem of transformations *metamorphoses* by the first century ce latin poet ovid in which the bard orpheus narrates the legend of the sculptor king of cyprus whose beautiful carved woman was brought to life by the goddess venus focusing on screen storylines with a pygmalion subtext from silent cinema to buffy the vampire slayer and lars and the real girl this book looks at why and how the made over or manufactured woman has survived through the centuries and what we can learn about this problematic model of perfection from the perspective of the past and the present given the myriad representations of ovid s myth can we really make a modern text a tool of interpretation for an ancient poem this book answers with a resounding yes and explains why it is so important to give antiquity back its future

elizabethan english culture is saturated with tales and figures from ovid s *metamorphoses* while most of these narratives interrogate metamorphosis and transformation many tales such as those of philomela hecuba or orpheus also highlight heightened states of emotion especially in powerless or seemingly powerless characters when these tales are translated and retold in the new cultural context of renaissance england a distinct politics of ovidian emotion emerges through intertextual readings in diverse cultural contexts ovid and the politics of emotion in elizabethan england reveals the ways these representations helped redefine emotions and the political efficacy of emotional expression in sixteenth century england

this collection of essays examines the ways ovid s diverse œuvre has been translated rewritten adapted and responded to by a range of french and francophone women from the renaissance to the present it aims to reveal lesser known voices in ovidian reception studies and to offer a wider historical perspective on the complex question of ovid and gender ranging from renaissance poetry to contemporary creative criticism it charts an understudied strand of reception studies emphasizing how a longer view allows us to explore and challenge the notion of a female tradition of ovidian reception the range of genres analysed here poetry verse and prose translation theatre epistolary fiction autofiction autobiography film creative critique and novels also reflect the diversity of the ovidian texts in reception from the heroides to the *metamorphoses* from the amores to the *ars amatoria* from the *tristia* to the *fasti* the study brings an array of critical approaches to bear on well known authors such as george sand julia kristeva and marguerite yourcenar as well as less known figures from contemporary writer linda lê to the early modern catherine and madeline des roches exploring exile identity queerness displacement voice expectations of modesty the poetics of translation and the problems posed by ovid s erotized violence to name just some of the volume s rich themes the epilogue by translator and novelist marie cosnay points towards new eco critical and creative

directions in ovidian scholarship and reception students and scholars of french studies classics comparative literature and translation studies will find much to interest them in this diverse collection of essays

susan wiseman analyses mythical and natural creatures in english renaissance writing including shakespeare s a midsummer night s dream and the tempest

arthur golding 1536 1606 translated the metamorphoses of ovid into vigorous supple english fourteeners beguiling readers with the pace and freshness of the ancient narrative his was the translation that shakespeare knew and golding s stories unfold in a landscape as homely and enchanted as the athenian wood of a midsummer night s dream book jacket

presents retellings of both well known and forgotten greek myths along with information on how they have remained a vital influence in western culture from renaissance painters to modern day hollywood

ovid and his influence are studied in classrooms as various as his poetry and this approaches volume aims to help instructors in those diverse teaching environments part 1 materials is fittingly collaborative and features brief overviews designed to give nonspecialists background on the more challenging aspects of teaching ovid contributors examine his life and legacy religion and relation to the visual arts as well as his afterlife in the latin classroom in various translations and in the ovide moralisé the editors detail the contexts in which ovid is taught identify trends in teaching his work and the ovidian tradition and recommend editions and resources for classroom use the introduction to part 2 approaches considers ovid s relation to vergil and the development of ovid s influence and reception from the medieval and early modern period to the reinvigoration of ovid studies in the twentieth century in the four sections that follow contributors provide practical ideas for classroom instruction examine the political and moral discourses shaping ovid and his legacy explore how gender and the body are represented in ovid and the ovidian tradition and look at various ways ovid s works have been used and transformed by writers as diverse as dante cervantes and ransmayer

this is the first book in english to analyse the medical category of hermaphroditism in spain over the period 1850 1960 it attempts to show how the relationship between the male and female body biological sex gender and sexuality constantly changed in the light of emerging medical legal and social influences

this dissertation explores the political and cultural functions of digressive classical mythological episodes in two early modern spanish and two colonial spanish american

epic poems juan boscan s leandro 1543 alonso de ercilla s la araucana 1569 78 89 lope de vega s jerusalen conquistada 1609 and juan de miramontes s armas antarticas 1608 09 beyond the brief mythological allusions typical of many hispanic epics of the day these four works include sustained episodes of classical mythology that only indirectly relate to the main plots of the poems i argue that these mythical passages serve essential roles in the epics by foreshadowing recasting and emphasizing certain significant ideas and actions of the works in doing so i contend that the mythological interpolations contribute to the epics celebration and embellishment of the artistic military and colonial endeavors of the spanish empire of the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries this focus allows me to examine issues of poetic imitation the relation between visual artwork and the poetic texts as well as the social tensions that often characterize epic poetry of early modern spain and colonial spanish america

the epic metamorphoses ovid s most renowned work has regained its stature among the masterpieces of great poets such as vergil horace and tibullus yet its irreverent tone and bold defiance of generic boundaries set the metamorphoses apart from its contemporaries ovid before exile provides a compelling new reading of the epic examining the text in light of circumstances surrounding the final years of augustus reign a time when a culture of poets and patrons was in sharp decline discouraging and even endangering artistic freedom of expression patricia j johnson demonstrates how the production of art specifically poetry changed dramatically during the reign of augustus by ovid s final decade in rome the atmosphere for artistic work had transformed leading to a drop in poetic production of quality johnson shows how ovid in the episodes of artistic creation that anchor his metamorphoses responded to his audience and commented on artistic circumstances in rome

myths are never limited to place or time they are ever present as each epoch offers them a new guise it may even be said that meaning itself is achieved by the same energies that animate myth black light examines four paintings from the modern tradition in the light of episodes from antique mythology as the myths illuminate the paintings and paintings throw light on the myths gooding shows that themes from ancient sources can be seen to resonate in the modern representations tracing unexpected thematic correspondences across two millennia of literature and art the author finds that whatever meaning is sought through interpretation myth becomes an indispensable tool of analysis in the work of the classical authors such as sophocles and ovid gooding finds mythic elements which are also present in paintings by manet matisse richards and warhol opening a new dialogue between modern and ancient black light explores living myth in modern paintings publisher s description
