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why did traditional chinese literati so often identify themselves with women in their writing what can this tell us about how they viewed themselves as men and how they understood masculinity how did their attitudes in turn shape the martial heroes and other masculine models they constructed martin huang attempts to answer these questions in this valuable work on manhood in late imperial china he focuses on the ambivalent and often paradoxical role played by women and the feminine in the intricate negotiating process of male gender identity in late imperial cultural discourses two common strategies for constructing and negotiating masculinity were adopted in many of the works examined here the first what huang calls the strategy of analogy constructs masculinity in close association with the feminine the second the strategy of differentiation defines it in sharp contrast to the feminine in both cases women bear the burden as the defining other in this study feminine is a rather broad concept denoting a wide range of gender phenomena associated with women from the politically and socially destabilizing to the exemplary wives and daughters celebrated in confucian chastity discourse

this book examines cities of the jiangnan region of south central china between the twelfth and nineteenth centuries an area considered to be the model of a successfully developing regional economy the six studies focus on the urban centers of suzhou hangzhou yangzhou and shanghai emphasizing the regional focus the authors explore the interconnections and sequential relationships between these major cities and analyze common themes such as the development of handicraft industry transport and commerce class structure ethnic diversity and internal immigration and the social and political pressures generated by developments in manufacturing taxes and government politics the book provides a valuable resource on commercial development and internal economic and social development in pre modern china particularly on specific regional development and the historical role of traditional chinese cities

in this feminist history of eight centuries of private life in china francesca bray inserts women into the history of technology and adds technology to the history of women bray takes issue with the orientalist image that traditional

chinese women were imprisoned in the inner quarters deprived of freedom and dignity and so physically and morally deformed by footbinding and the tyrannies of patriarchy that they were incapable of productive work she proposes a concept of gynotechnics a set of everyday technologies that define women s roles as a creative new way to explore how societies translate moral and social principles into a web of material forms and bodily practices bray examines three different aspects of domestic life in china tracing their developments from 1000 to 1800 a d she begins with the shell of domesticity the house focusing on how domestic space embodied hierarchies of gender she follows the shift in the textile industry from domestic production to commercial production despite increasing emphasis on women s reproductive roles she argues this cannot be reduced to childbearing female hierarchies within the family reinforced the power of wives whose responsibilities included ritual activities and financial management as well as the education of children in this feminist history of eight centuries of private life in china francesca bray inserts women into the history of technology and adds technology to the history of women bray takes issue with the orientalist image that traditional chinese women were

a tender voyage is the first full length study of the history of childhood and children s lives in late imperial china the author draws on an extraordinary range of sources to analyze both the normative concept of childhood literary and philosophical and the treatment and experience of children in china the study begins with the history of pediatrics and newborn care and their evolution over time the author moves on to the social environment of the child including models of upbringing and expected behavior and the treatment of different kinds of children including the rebellious and the gentle child she examines the role of the mother notably her close and complex relations with her sons and the broader emotional world of children their relationships with the adults around them and the destructive power of death the last section discusses concepts of childhood in china and the west throughout the study keeps in view the issue of representation versus practice the role of memory and the importance of listening for what is not said

this study of the regulation of sexuality in the qing dynasty explores the social context for sexual behavior criminalized by the state showing how regulation shifted away from status to a new regime of gender that mandated a uniform standard of sexual morality and criminal liability for all people regardless of their social status

medicine and society in late imperial china explores the vibrant medical landscape in late imperial china 1600 1850 focusing on one of the most cultured and elegant cities in the lower yangzi region suzhou the central theme of the book is that the economic prosperity and intellectual vibrancy of late imperial jiangnan fostered the emergence of a community of physicians who engaged in lively debates concerning qualifications and practice leading to a growing sense of identity and new ways of theorizing and practicing medicine it shows that the classical medical tradition interacted in a fluid relationship with both the state and the folk traditions medicine and society in late imperial china is divided into two parts part i provides a broad framework on the discourse on the ideal physician as well as examining the sanhuang miao temple of the three emperors and challenges to existing medical theories by the wenbing warm factor school part ii focuses on suzhou physicians and their writings within the broad medical tradition illustrates a local perspective of medicine s relationship with the state through an examination of the outbreak of epidemics in suzhou and discusses the development of the fields of specialties in medicine

between the 1880s and the 1930s children became the focus of unprecedented scientific and professional interest in modernizing societies worldwide including in the russia empire and then the soviet union those who claimed children as special objects of investigation were initially spread across a network of imperfectly professionalized scholarly and occupational groups based mostly in the fields of medicine education and psychology from their various perspectives they made ambitious claims about the contributions that their emergent expertise made to the understanding of and intervention in human bio psycho social development the international movement that arose out of this catalyzed the institutionalization of new domains of knowledge including developmental and educational psychology special needs education and child psychiatry science of the child charts the evolution of the child science movement in russia from the crimean war to the second world war it is the first comprehensive history in english of the rise and fall of this multidisciplinary field across the late imperial and soviet periods drawing on ideas and concepts emanating from a variety of theoretical domains the study provides new insights into the concerns of russia s professional intelligentsia with matters of biosocial reproduction and investigates the incorporation of scientific knowledge and professional expertise focused on child development into the making of the welfare warfare state in the rapidly changing political landscape of the early soviet era

marginalia are a variety of writings and symbols written by readers in book margins this study focuses on marginalia and explores the reading practices and the scholarly culture of late imperial china beginning in the late ming and early qing more scholars devoted themselves to reading and collating ancient texts they developed the habit of writing marginalia while reading of transcribing other readers marginalia and of printing marginalia all of which formed a

particular scholarly culture this book explores how this culture developed gained momentum and shaped the styles lives thoughts and mind states of scholars in late imperial china

demanding and offering tribute is a most common feature in human societies and nothing special to china in the course of the development of neolithic and later societies social classes have developed where persons who achieved superior positions first could demand presents or tribute from neighboring societies they defeated and then with the assistance of sturdy servants from their own people china was certainly no exception to that principle and one of the first terms for tax was thus gong tribute in china s early feudatory social system tribute was demanded from lower political entities and the mutual political relations were already highly developed during the zhou dynasty 1045 256 bce this system of inner chinese relations became a sort of matrix when china expanded and achieved contact with countries which were more or less independent and thus the tribute system evolved the individual case studies in this volume focus on the latest manifestations of the tribute system in late imperial china
