while students and general readers typically cannot relate to esoteric definitions of science fiction they readily understand the genre as a literature that characteristically deals with subjects such as new inventions space robot and aliens this book looks at science fiction in precisely this manner with twenty one chapters that each deal with a subject that is repeatedly addressed in science fiction of recent centuries based on a packet of original

The War of the Worlds is a science fiction novel by English author H. G. Wells first serialized in 1897 by Pearson's magazine in the UK and by *Cosmopolitan* magazine in the US the novel's first appearance in hardcover was in 1898 from publisher William Heinemann of London written between 1895 and 1897 it is one of the earliest stories to detail a conflict between mankind and an extraterrestrial race the novel is the first person narrative of both an unnamed protagonist in Surrey and of his younger brother in London as southern England is invaded by Martians the novel is one of the most commented-on works in the science fiction canon the plot has been related to invasion literature of the time the novel has been variously interpreted as a commentary on evolutionary theory British imperialism and generally Victorian superstitions fears and prejudices Wells said that the plot arose from a discussion with his brother Frank about the catastrophic impact of the British on indigenous Tasmanians what would happen he wondered if Martians did to Britain what the British had done to the Tasmanians the Tasmanians however lacked the lethal pathogens to defeat their invaders
