Educational systems Curricula often prioritize dominant cultural narratives neglecting or misrepresenting the histories and contributions of marginalized groups This can lead to feelings of invisibility and alienation among students from these groups

Media representation Stereotypical and limited portrayals of minority cultures in media reinforce harmful biases and limit societal understanding This underrepresentation contributes to the devaluation of diverse cultural experiences

Language policies Imposing a dominant language can marginalize individuals who speak other languages limiting their access
