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byzantine intellectuals not only had direct access to neoplatonic sources in the original language but also at times showed a particular interest in them during the early byzantine period platonism significantly contributed to the development of christian doctrines and paradoxically remained a rival world view that was perceived by many christian thinkers as a serious threat to their own intellectual identity this problematic relationship was to become even more complex during the following centuries byzantine authors made numerous attempts to harmonize neoplatonic doctrines with christianity as well as to criticize refute and even condemn them the papers assembled in this volume discuss a number of specific questions and concerns that drew the interest of byzantine scholars in different periods towards neoplatonic sources in an attempt to identify and explore the central issues in the reception of neoplatonic texts during the byzantine era this is the first volume of the sub series byzantinisches archiv series philosophica which will be dedicated to the rapidly growing field of research in byzantine philosophical texts

this open access book is the first publication to provide a comparative framework for the

study of martial culture and historical martial arts in europe and asia in particular in italy and china due to the interdisciplinary nature of martial studies contributors to this volume include historians archeologists art historians scholars of fencing literature metallurgists as well as contemporary master swordsmiths and masters of arms in historical martial arts assembling researchers from these diverse fields this book offers a multi perspectival and dynamic view of martial culture across time and space the cross cultural and interdisciplinary significance of this book cannot be overemphasized whereas a number of contributors are internationally recognized and indeed leading authorities in their respective fields for example jeffrey shaw has been a world leading new media artist and scholar since the 1970s while ma mingda is a well known historian and the contemporary founder of chinese martial studies and while there are significant overlaps in their research interests this book brings their research within a single volume for the first time equally significant the book is structured in such a way to reflect the various core aspects of martial studies particularly in relation to the study of historic sword culture including history culture philosophy literature and knowledge transmission material culture as well as the technical aspects of historical fencing as one of the first titles on martial studies this book becomes a reference not only for scholars taking an interest in this subject but also for historians scholars with interest in chinese and or italian history particularly of the medieval or early modern periods the history of international relations in asia far east anthropologists scholars of martial arts studies and researchers in sword making and or historic metallurgy

this volume examines the painting sculpture decorative arts and architecture produced in nine important court cities of italy during the course of the fourteenth fifteenth and sixteenth centuries although each chapter represents a separate study of a particular geographical locale many common themes emerge this volume gives a multifaceted consideration of the art created for princes prelates confraternities and civic authorities works displayed in public squares private palaces churches and town halls including six essays specially commissioned that explore the interaction of artists and their civic and or courtly patrons within the context of prevailing cultural political and religious circumstances the court cities of northern italy provides a rich supplement to traditional accounts of the artistic heritage of the italian renaissance which has traditionally focused on the florentine venetian and roman traditions the book includes 35 color plates and 221 black and white illustrations

robert koehl has long considered processions to have played an integral role in aegean bronze age societies papers concentrate mainly on evidence from crete the cyclades and the greek mainland with additional perspectives from abroad these geographic divisions forming the basic outline of this volume

thousands of shattered limestone pieces came to light in 1974 at the mont e prama site in western sardinia they have been reassembled into dozens of striking colossal statues that reward close study by archaeologists historians conservators and restorers the giant statues and the individual tombs in this monumental necropolis sculpted by a powerful

mediterranean civilization make Mont'e Prama a uniquely rich representation of a culture's values and traditions in the bronze age and the iron age. This is the first English language book to explore Mont'e Prama's limestone statues among the most important archaeological discoveries of the past fifty years and the source of fresh discoveries even today. It is written by the people who are leading the excavation and restoration of these treasures, researching the artifacts and their context and presenting the eerie faces, towering bodies, and sprawling site to the world. A lost Mediterranean culture takes the reader through the details of the various discoveries at Mont'e Prama, recounting the history of scholarship on the artifacts and describing the landscape, the context, and the meticulous restoration efforts. It also addresses the illicit trafficking of Sardinian cultural property, lavishly illustrated with photographs and other figures that showcase fine details. Raphael's ostrich begins with a little studied aspect of Raphael's painting, the ostrich, which appears as an attribute of Justice, painted in the Sala di Costantino in the Vatican. D'Elia traces the cultural and artistic history of the ostrich from its appearances in ancient Egyptian hieroglyphs to the menageries and grotesque ornaments of sixteenth-century Italy. Following the complex history of shifting interpretations given to the ostrich in scientific, literary, religious, poetic, and satirical texts, and images, D'Elia demonstrates the rich variety of ways in which people made sense of this living monster, which was depicted as the embodiment of heresy, stupidity, perseverance, justice, fortune, gluttony, and other virtues and vices. Because Raphael was revered as a god of art, artists imitated and competed with his ostrich, while religious and cultural critics complained about the potential for misinterpreting such obscure imagery. This book not only considers the history of the ostrich but also explores how Raphael's painting forced viewers to question how meaning is attributed to the natural world, a debate of central importance in early modern Europe at a time when the disciplines of modern art history and natural history were developing. The strangeness of Raphael's ostrich, situated at the crossroads of art, religion, myth, and natural history, both reveals lesser-known sides of Raphael's painting and illuminates major cultural shifts in attitudes toward nature and images in the Renaissance. More than simply an examination of a single artist or a single subject, Raphael's ostrich offers an accessible, erudite, and charming alternative to Vasari's pervasive model of the history of sixteenth-century Italian art.

The Etruscan city of Caere and eleven other Etruscan city states were among the first urban centers in ancient Italy.
