silent strength of the bedrock By layering these voices together McHarg orchestrated a symphony of ecological data revealing a landscape that spoke in a language previously unheard The resulting map wasn't just a technical document it was a conversation between humanity and nature a dialogue urging respect and collaboration 2 He famously recounted a project in Philadelphia where the overlay maps clearly indicated a steep slope as unsuitable for development The developers initially resistant eventually yielded to the irrefutable evidence presented by the maps The result was a decision to 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David Gordon was one of the most interesting and original Jewish thinkers of the twentieth century. *Quest for Life* presents Gordon's philosophy, which was developed in Hebrew at the beginning of the twentieth century, to the English reading public. It discusses the role played by the early Land of Israel pioneering labor community in the development of his thought and offers a new understanding of its major themes, including the relation of humanity to nature, human freedom, ethnicity, religion, and ethics. In addition, the book discusses the repercussions of Gordon's thought with respect to contemporary civilization while suggesting its implicit quest for life as the basis for a re-evaluation of such topics as the meaning of human life, Jewish peoplehood, and the idea of a Jewish homeland.

ian l mcharg s landmark book design with nature changed the face of landscape architecture and planning by promoting the idea that the design of human settlements should be based on ecological principles mcharg was one of the earliest and most influential proponents of the notion that an understanding of the processes that form landscapes should underlie design decisions in to heal the earth mcharg has joined with frederick steiner a noted scholar of landscape architecture and planning to bring forth a valuable cache of his writings produced between the 1950s and the 1990s mcharg and steiner have each provided original material that links the writings together and places them within the historical context of planning design work and within the larger field of ecological planning as practiced today the book moves from the theoretical beginning with the 1962 essay man and environment which sets forth the themes of religion science and creativity that emerge and reappear throughout mcharg s work to the practical including discussions of methods and techniques for ecological planning as well as case studies other sections address the link between ecology and design and the issue of ecological planning at a regional scale covering topics such as education and training necessary to develop the field of ecological planning how to organize and arrange biophysical information to reveal landscape patterns the importance of incorporating social factors into ecological planning and more to heal the earth provides a larger framework and a new perspective on mcharg s work that brings to light the growth and development of his key ideas over a forty year period it is an important contribution to the literature and will be essential reading for students and scholars of ecological planning as well as for professional planners and landscape architects

new poetic work from the grandfather of ecological planning and author of the classic book design with nature twenty five poems in all ian mcharg founded the department of landscape architecture at the university of pennsylvania in 1954 and has become identified as founder of ecological planning and design he has written numerous articles and professional reports but is best known for the classic design with nature a finalist for the national book award in 1969 he was awarded the national medal of art from president bush in 1992 he lives with his wife and two sons in pennsylvania

humans have always been influenced by natural landscapes and always will be even as we create ever larger cities and our developments fundamentally change the nature of the earth around us in human ecology noted city planner and landscape architect frederick steiner encourages us to consider how human cultures have been shaped by natural forces and how

we might use this understanding to contribute to a future where both nature and people thrive human ecology is the study of the interrelationships between humans and their environment drawing on diverse fields from biology and geography to sociology engineering and architecture steiner admirably synthesizes these perspectives through the lens of landscape architecture a discipline that requires its practitioners to consciously connect humans and their environments after laying out eight principles for understanding human ecology the book s chapters build from the smallest scale of connection our homes and expand to community scales regions nations and ultimately examine global relationships between people and nature in this age of climate change a new approach to planning and design is required to envision a livable future human ecology provides architects landscape architects urban designers and planners and students in those fields with timeless principles for new creative thinking about how their work can shape a vibrant resilient future for ourselves and our planet
