by analyzing ten examples of buildings that embody the human experience at an extraordinary level this book clarifies the central importance of the role of function in architecture as a generative force in determining built form using familiar twentieth century buildings as case studies the authors present these from a new perspective based on their functional design concepts here grabow and spreckelmeyer expand the definition of human use to that of an art form by re evaluating these buildings from an aesthetic and ecological view of function each building is described from the point of view of a major functional concept or idea of human use which then spreads out and influences the spatial organization built form and structure in doing so each building is presented as an exemplar that reaches beyond the pragmatic concerns of a narrow program and demonstrates how functional concepts can inspire great design evoke archetypal human experience and help us to understand how architecture embodies the deeper purposes and meanings of everyday life

the fine arts are traditionally seen to have intrinsic value that is they are valuable in themselves but this poses a problem for architecture its works are designed to serve our purposes and therefore it is classed as functional carving out a new space edward winters argues why architecture is a fine art and finds a place for the fine art of architecture in the cultural environment in which we structure our lives winters reconciles intrinsic value as a fine art with extrinsic value as shelter security and comfort without collapsing into the modernist conception of functionalism he draws on the apollonian and the dionysian to resolve the apparent conflict between the two values the former requiring contemplative detached reflection the latter an engaged embodied entanglement with the festive mood inspired by the immediate situation architecture winters claims is to be regarded as functional but this functionality is subsumed under the intrinsic aesthetic value of living well

introducing the main positions in the philosophy of architecture through the lens of the timeless argument about what constitutes art winters lays out a humanistic view of the medium and extends our understanding of aesthetics and the everyday

american philosopher nelson goodman 1906 1998 was one of the foremost analytical thinkers of the twentieth century with groundbreaking contributions in the fields of logic philosophy of science epistemology and aesthetics this book is an introduction to the aspects of goodman s philosophy which have been the most influential among architects and architectural theorists goodman specifically discussed architecture in his major work on aesthetics the languages of art an approach to a theory of symbols 1968 and in two essays how buildings mean 1985 and on capturing cities 1991 his main philosophical notions in ways of worldmaking 1978 also apply well to architecture goodman s thought is particularly attractive because of its constructive aspect there is not a given and immutable world but both knowledge and reality are constantly built and rebuilt whereas other theories such as deconstruction implicitly entail an undoing of modern precepts goodman s conception of world making offers a positive constructive way to understand how a plural reality is made and remade goodman s approach to architecture is not only relevant thinking in providing new insights to understanding the built environment but serves also as an illustration of analytical thinking in architecture this book shows that the methods concepts and ways of arguing characteristic of analytical philosophy are helpful tools to examine buildings in a novel and fruitful way and they will certainly enhance the architect s critical skills when designing and thinking about architecture

can architecture help us find our place and way in today s complex world can it return individuals to a whole to a world to a community developing giedion s claim that contemporary architecture s main task is to interpret a way of life valid for our time philosopher karsten harries answers that architecture should serve a common ethos but if architecture is to meet that task it first has to free itself from the dominant formalist approach and get beyond the notion that its purpose is to produce endless variations of the decorated shed in a series of cogent and balanced arguments harries questions the premises on which architects and theorists have long relied premises which have contributed to architecture s current identity crisis and marginalization he first criticizes the aesthetic approach focusing on the problems of decoration and ornament he then turns to the language of architecture if the main task of architecture is indeed interpretation in just what sense can it be said to speak and what should it be speaking about expanding upon suggestions made by martin heidegger harries also considers the relationship of building to the idea and meaning of dwelling architecture harries observes has a responsibility to community but its ethical function is inevitably also political he concludes by examining these seemingly paradoxical functions

the optimum imperative examines architecture s multiple entanglements within the problematics of socialist lifestyle in postwar czechoslovakia situated in the period loosely bracketed by the signing of the munich accords in 1938 which affected czechoslovakia s entrance into world war ii and the warsaw pact troops occupation of prague in 1968 the book investigates three decades of czech architecture highlighting a diverse cast of protagonists key among them are the theorist and architect karel honzík and a small group of his colleagues in the club for the study of consumption the award winning czechoslovak pavilion at the 1958 world expo in brussels and sial a group of architects from liberec that emerged from the national network of stavoprojekt offices during the reform years only to be subsumed back into it in the wake of czechoslovak normalization this episodic approach enables a long view of the way that the project of constructing socialism was

made disciplinarily specific for architecture through the constant interpretation of socialist lifestyle both as a narrative framework and as a historical goal without sanitizing history of its absurd contortions in discourse and in daily life the book takes as its subject the complex and dynamic relationships between cold war politics state power disciplinary legitimating narratives and czech architects optimism for socialism it proposes that these key dimensions of practicing architecture and building socialism were intertwined and even commensurate at times through the framework of socialist lifestyle

evolution is by choice this is not a passive truth but a conscious commitment one that lies at the heart of what i call the advanced city coined and thoroughly introduced here in the book this new concept is based on people centric and data informed processes to enhance our cities and communities for their future and not for imagining future cities this is not another model in the long line of urban prescriptions nor a distant techno utopia to be fantasized it is a paradigm shift an invitation to think feel and build differently the advanced city is a lived revolution a dynamic process grounded in values purpose and practice too often we romanticize the future city glass towers flying cars machines and robots everywhere data driven dreams but these visions distract us from the urgency of the present they bypass the real work of transformation by projecting change onto an abstract tomorrow the advanced city asks something deeper what kind of cities are we actively creating today here and now it is not about waiting for innovation to arrive it is about choosing a different path rooted in responsibility equity and long view thinking this book is not about cities as machines markets or spectacles it is about cities as ecosystems of meaning struggle creativity and care the advanced city is a movement of re engagement for academics for planners for civic leaders and for all who call the city home it calls on us to be co creators of our urban futures not passive consumers of predesigned and predetermined solutions we need radical honesty about the failures of current systems and the intellectual courage to reimagine what s possible the advanced city resists the illusion of smartness and returns us to human truths interdependence justice and purpose it is about making change not waiting for it so this is not a new product for urban branding it is rather a process for transformation a paradigm shift and an urban revolution a call to co create cities that are not merely advanced in function but advanced in wisdom here i also call for the development of brother cities and advanced development goals adgs if not now when if not us who let the advanced city be an urban revolution of now and the future to be lived not later but now not for the future cities but for the future of our cities and communities

in living in the landscape arnold berleant explores new ways of thinking about how we live and might live in the landscapes that enfold us through the concepts of aesthetic engagement and environmental continuity he proposes a new paradigm that offers a holistic approach to the meaning of place and places of meaning in our lives although environmental aesthetics is linked in the popular mind to dramatic vistas and monumental landscapes the grand canyon for example berleant is much more concerned with the commonplace settings of everyday life he argues that our active appreciation of or aesthetic engagement with the prosaic landscapes of home work local travel and recreation plays a vital role in our discovery of hidden continuities as well as pleasure and meaning in the places we inhabit berleant begins with a general introduction to environmental aesthetics identifying the kinds of experience meanings and values it involves and describing its historical sources and the issues with which it is concerned in the rest of the book he spotlights new directions in the field as they relate to education community creativity and the sacred and provides an insightful analysis of negative environmental aesthetics throughout he is both thoughtful and entertaining as evidenced in his extended critique of the pop post modern environment of disney world berleant addresses issues commonly associated with the environmental movement e g

preservation pollution control and quality of life but his study draws from a wide range of disciplines and for that reason should also appeal to scholars and students interested in art and aesthetics landscape architecture and planning urban and environmental design and cultural geography as well as environmental studies
