contributing to the independence and democratisation of Korean society through the establishment of a scientific and practical historiography the association engages in joint research projects spreading the results of historical research to the masses and publishing and distributing academic journals and popular history texts the Korean historical research association now has more than 700 members and has created an efficient organisation that publishes and disseminates papers books and bulletins
