this is a classic edition of geoffrey beattie s and andrew ellis influential introduction to the psychology of human language and communication now including a new reflective introduction from the authors drawing on elements from many sub disciplines including cognitive and social psychology psycholinguistics and neuropsychology the book offers an approach which breaches conventional disciplinary boundaries exploring the diverse nature of communication beattie and ellis focus on the range of human communicative channels and the variations which occur both between and within societies and cultures written from an informative and entertaining historical perspective the psychology of language and communication remains a key resource for anyone interested in the psychology of communication language and linguistics 30 years on from its first publication

this book examines the topic of communication strategies the ways in which people seek to express themselves or understand what someone else is saying or writing typically the term has referred to the strategies that non native speakers use to address the linguistic and pragmatic problems encountered in interactions with native and non native speakers of the language in question studies adopting a psycholinguistic perspective are well represented and updated in this volume other chapters re examine communication strategies from a sociolinguistic perspective exploring the strategies non native speakers and their conversational partners use to create shared meanings in ongoing discourse these studies reveal how communication strategies can serve to construct participants identities and social relationships finally the book incorporates a number of chapters which cover strategy like behaviour in other related areas such as language pathology child bilingualism normal native adult interaction and mother tongue education these studies add fresh dimensions to the study of communication strategies showing how the concept can usefully be extended beyond the realm of second language acquisition and use and pointing out the commonalities in many domains of language behaviour

how is speech produced and understood in the context of everyday communication first published in 1975 this book is considered one the best of the early books in this field the task of psycholinguistics is to discover how people produce and comprehend speech this encompasses virtually all aspects of psychology including perceptual conceptual and social processes the authors tried to capture the flavour of this approach to the psychology of language by describing the major contemporary issues problems and phenomena of the time

being dealt with in laboratories and in field studies and by trying to make sense of the data they had experimental psycholinguistics an introduction does not try to deal exhaustively with any one issue in linguistics or in psychology rather it tries to integrate the authors knowledge of language and language behaviour so that someone entering the field has an intelligible framework with which to start

this accessibly written and pedagogically rich text delivers the most comprehensive examination of its subject carefully drawing on the most up to date research and covering a breadth of the central topics including communication language acquisition language processing language disorders speech writing and development this book also examines an array of other progressive areas in the field neglected in similar works such as bilingualism sign language as well as comparative communication based on her globally orientated research and academic expertise author shelia kennison innovatively applies psycholinguistics to real world examples through analysing the heterogenous traits of a wide variety of languages with its engaging easy to understand prose this text guides students gently and sequentially through an introduction to the subject the book is designed for undergraduate and graduate students taking courses in psycholinguistics

originally published in 1985 detailed exploration of the dynamics of language within social psychology forms a social psychology of language which is distinct from other approaches this volume presents some of the growing body of research in this area with many theoretical models and ideas chapters consider the relationship between language and social situations looking at cognitive structures in how communication between individuals develops in childhood and beyond how it defines social situations influences others expresses feelings and values evokes social categorizations and how it can break down

using a novel model this book investigates the psycholinguistics of dialogue approaching language use as a social activity

this edited volume investigates the concept of ambiguity and how it manifests itself in language and communication from a new perspective the main goal is to uncover a great mystery why can we communicate effectively despite the fact that ambiguity is pervasive in the language that we use and conversely how do speakers and hearers use ambiguity and vagueness to achieve a specific goal comprehensive answers to these questions are provided from different fields which focus on the study of language in particular linguistics literary criticism rhetoric psycholinguistics theology media studies and law by bringing together these different disciplines the book documents a radical change in the research on ambiguity the innovation is brought about by the transdisciplinary perspective of the individual and co authored papers that bridge the gaps between disciplines the research program that underlies this volume establishes theoretical connections between the areas of psycho linguistics that concentrate on the question of how the system of language works with the areas of rhetoric literary studies theology and law that focus on the question of how communication works in discourse and text from the perspective of both production and perception a three dimensional ambiguity model is presented that serves as a theoretical anchor point for the analyses of the different types of ambiguities by the contributors of this volume the ambiguity model is a hybrid model which brings together the different perspectives on how language and the language system work with respect to ambiguity as well as the question of how ambiguity is employed in communication and in different communicational settings a set of specific features that are relevant for the description of ambiguity such as whether the ambiguity arises in the production or perception process and whether it occurs in strategic or nonstrategic communication are defined the research program rests on the assumption that both the production and the perception of ambiguity as well as its strategic and nonstrategic occurrence can only be understood by exploring how these factors interact with each other and a reference system when ambiguity is generated and resolved the collection ambiguity language and communication constitutes a superb introduction to the workings of ambiguity in language and communication along with

extensive analyses of many different examples from different fields as such it is relevant for students of linguistics literary studies rhetoric law and theology and at the same time there is sufficient quality analysis and new research questions to benefit advanced readers who are interested in ambiguity

in contrast to traditional approaches of mainstream psycholinguists the authors of communicating with one another approach spontaneous spoken discourse as a dynamic process rich with structures patterns and rules other than conventional grammar and syntax daniel c o connell and sabine kowal thoroughly critique mainstream psycholinguistics proposing instead a shift in theoretical focus from experimentation to field observation from monologue to dialogue and from the written to the spoken they invoke four theoretical principles intersubjectivity perspectivity open endedness and verbal integrity their analyses of historical and original research raise significant questions about the relationship between spoken and written discourse particularly with regard to transcription and punctuation with emphasis on political discourse media interviews and dramatic performance the authors review both familiar and unexplored characteristics of spontaneous spoken communication including 1 the speaker's use of prosody 2 the functions of interjections 3 what fillers do for a living 4 turn taking smooth and otherwise 5 laughter applause and booing from individual listener to collective audience 6 pauses silence and the art of listening the paradigm shift proposed in communicating with one another will interest and provoke readers concerned about communicative language use including psycholinguists sociolinguists and anthropological linguists

research on language and communication development and intervention in persons with mental retardation has been conducted at a fast and furious pace during the last two decades past attempts to summarize this research have been rather restricted focusing on a single narrowly defined substantive domain such as lexical development or of a single etiology such as down syndrome this volume in contrast presents a critical integrative review of research and theory on language development and processing across all domains and a variety of etiologies in addition many previous attempts to review portions of this research have failed to consider the research within the context of current theory and data from developmental psycholinguistics and linguistics a major contribution of this book is the emphasis on relevant work outside of mental retardation for understanding and treating the language and

communication problems of persons with mental retardation finally this book is comprehensive and up to date across all the areas of language covered including appropriate introductory material in linguistics and psychology discussions of the innateness cognition first and motherese views of normal language acquisition in addition the authors extensive bibliography is valuable in and of itself to any serious student or professional in the area
