half a century ago the primary contours of the history of the jews in roman times were not subject to much debate this standard account collapsed however when a handful of insights undermined the traditional historical method the method long enlisted by historians for eliciting facts from sources in response to these insights a new historical method gradually emerged rewriting ancient jewish history critiques the traditional historical method and makes a case for the new one illustrating how to write anew ancient jewish history at the heart of the traditional historical method lie three fundamental presumptions the traditional historical method regularly presumes that multiple versions of a text or tradition are equally authentic it presumes that many ancient jewish sources are the products of largely immanent forces of cloistered jewish communities and barring any local grounds for suspicion it presumes that most ancient jewish texts faithfully reflect their sources and reliably recount events rewriting ancient jewish history unfurls the failings of this approach it promotes the new historical method which circumvents the flawed traditional presumptions while plotting anew the limits of rational argumentation in historical inquiry this crucial reappraisal is a must read for students of jewish and roman history alike and a fascinating case study in how historians should approach their ancient sources

the past as liberation from history explores the difference between the social construction we call history and the lived experience we call the past arguing that by failing to distinguish between the two we risk unquestionably accepting as authoritative accounts of the past in which we have no voice it shows that identities rooted in the richness and variety of the past even when the history is painful serve the purpose of drawing us closer to one another as we seek to realize our shared dreams of life liberty and the pursuit of happiness by placing in counterpoint broader educational concerns with the teaching experiences of the author the study also explores this individual's testimony as a teacher seeking to make relevant for his students the examination of the past

seminar paper from the year 2021 in the subject english language and literature studies literature grade 10 language english abstract this paper investigates how the ambivalent perhaps even ambiguous definition of historia relates to the representation of history in the novel and how this representation again relates to its functionalisation by tom crick to answer this question this paper will primarily work with linda hutchinson's notion of historiographic metafiction while also pointing out similarities to the reading of waterland as a trauma narrative in taking a closer look at the protagonist narrator himself this paper argues that the protection from chaos and disorder which landow addresses is only achieved through a form of historical escapism superficially speaking graham swift's waterland is a novel about a history teacher who having lost his job forsakes the formal teaching of history and embarks on an extracurricular journey into his own past however upon closer examination waterland is more than that a novel about history itself it explores the whole mystery of history as swift himself puts it in the introduction to the novel waterland xv thus it is only logical that the novel prefaces its narrative with an insightful epigraph a dictionary definition of the latin word historia from which the english word history originates as can be seen above however said definition is ambivalent it is inherently polysemantic as judith ryan notes james acherson has likewise pointed out that the fact that historia can mean either history or fiction is significant for the historian and the writer of fiction must deal with similar problems in writing about the past the natural tendency of language towards proliferation of its meaning aside the epigraph leaves us with a very ambivalent concept of history which the narrative of waterland in its dealing with history then builds on since such a prominent theme in waterland the novel's representation of history has been thoroughly examined in secondary literature particularly against the theoretical background of what linda hutchinson has identified as historiographic metafiction
