Divine Stories Divyavadana

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the divyavadana is an enormous compendium of indian buddhist narratives written in sanskrit from the early centuries of the common era whose stories have since spread throughout asia as both narrative and narrative art leaving an indelible mark on buddhist thought and practice the stories in the collection were frequently used in the education of both monastics and laity in premodern asia exerting a powerful influence as moral exempla and legal precedent and they were considered by many to be the word of the buddha himself these stories were likewise canonical in their influence on buddhist art representations of these stories can be found across asia from kizil in china to sanchi in india to borobudur in indonesia it is not hyperbole to say that these are some of the most influential stories in the history of buddhism the stories presented here among the first texts to be inscribed by buddhists highlight the moral economy of karma illustrating how gestures of faith especially offerings can bring the reward of future happiness and ultimately liberation

explore this second volume of translations in vivid prose from one of the most celebrated collections of ancient buddhist stories actions never come to naught even after hundreds of millions of years when the right conditions gather and the time is right then they will have their effect on embodied beings ancient buddhist literature is filled with tales of past lives the buddha surrounded by his followers is asked how it came to be that a certain person has met a particular fate with his omniscience the buddha looks into eons past and uncovers the events that led to the present outcome and foretells the future as well with stories of wicked wives patricidal princes and shape shifting serpents divine stories offers a fascinating illustration of the law of karma the truth that the power of good and bad deeds is never lost these are some of the oldest buddhist tales ever committed to writing illuminating the culture of northern india in the early centuries of the common era and bringing to life the buddhist values of generosity and faith andy rotman s evocative translation combines accuracy with

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discover the eloquence and insight of the philosopher nagarjuna held by tradition to be a second buddha in this concise instruction for a king that is considered a masterpiece of buddhist literature in this profound work of five hundred verses we encounter a presentation of buddhism that integrates both the worldly and the transcendent the clear and sagacious advice laid out on every page serves as a road map to one s highest goal whether that goal is a better life here called the dharma of ascendance or the ultimate one of spiritual freedom the dharma of the highest good the verses written for an unnamed ruler touch on questions of statecraft but their broader themes speak to us today because they tackle the difficulty of integrating one s spiritual journey with the social and political demands of daily life nagarjuna was an indian buddhist teacher probably of the second century ce who was renowned for his astute articulation of the philosophy of the middle way madhyamaka his thoroughgoing critique of all forms of essentialism became a touchstone for mahayana buddhism in india tibet and throughout east asia and his importance for the development of the mahayana tradition can scarcely be exaggerated the translators here first rendered nagarjuna s letter for the dalai lama s teachings on the work in los angeles in 1997 while that commemorative edition was translated from the tibetan the present volume prioritizes the surviving sanskrit verses along with the only known indian commentary by the eleventh century scholar ajitamitra this is the first complete translation in english of the precious garland that takes the indian text and commentary as its primary authorities in addition the translators provide rigorous working editions of the sanskrit and tibetan verses they translate this elegant and precise rendering of nagarjuna s work is certain to become the touchstone translation of this celebrated buddhist text

taking a comparative approach which considers characters that are shared across the narrative traditions of early indian religions brahmanical hinduism jainism and buddhism shared characters in jain buddhist and hindu narrative explores key religious and social ideals as well as points of contact dialogue and contention between different worldviews the book focuses on three types of character gods heroes and kings that are of particular importance to early south asian narrative traditions because of their relevance to the concerns of the day such as the role of deities the qualities of a true hero or good ruler and the tension between worldly responsibilities and the pursuit of liberation characters incuding character roles and

lineages of characters that are shared between traditions reveal both a common narrative heritage and important differences in worldview and ideology that are developed in interaction with other worldviews and ideologies of the day as such this study sheds light on an important period of indian religious history and will be essential reading for scholars and postgraduate students working on early south asian religious or narrative traditions jain buddhist and hindu as well as being of interest more widely in the fields of religious studies classical indology asian studies and literary studies

nautilus book award winner the first full biography of mahaprajapati gautami the woman who raised the buddha examining her life through stories and canonical records mahaprajapati was the only mother the buddha ever knew his birth mother maya died shortly after childbirth and her sister mahaprajapati took the infant to her breast nurturing and raising him into adulthood while there is a lot of ambiguity overall in the buddha s biography this detail remains consistent across all buddhist traditions and literature in this first full biography of mahaprajapati the woman who raised the buddha presents her life story with attention to her early years as sister queen matriarch and mother as well as her later years as a nun drawing from story fragments and canonical records wendy garling reveals just how exceptional mahaprajapati s role was as leader of the first generation of buddhist women helping the buddha establish an equal community of lay and monastic women and men mother to the buddha mother to early buddhist women mother to the buddhist faith mahaprajapati s journey is finally presented as one interwoven with the founding of buddhism

ranging chronicle richard davis offers a history of india s myriad religious cultures that spans two thousand years from 1300 bec to 700 ce india davis writes was not only the birthplace of the religions we now know as hinduism buddhism and jainism it was also the home of other often unnamed religions that can be classified as folk or popular religions tracing these intertwined practices davis shows that the ardent and heterogeneous religious cultures of early india came to define and redefine themselves in relation to one another davis recounts this history through voices voices recorded in hymns poems songs didactic stories epic narratives scientific treatises and theological discourses as well as voices that speak through material remains whether monumental sculptures or tiny terracotta figurines of nameless goddesses he focuses on the long millennium often designated as classical india which stretches from the time of the founding figures of buddhism and jainism during the sixth century bee through the seventh century ce dynasties of the chalukyas and the pallavas in southern india throughout he emphasizes encounter interaction debate critique and borrowing among religious communities within a shared changing social and political reality the voices and visions of early india s religions davis shows us are fascinating in their multiplicity

this book provides close historical theological and cultural analyses of an important but neglected late antique writer isaac of antioch who was active during the second half of the fifth century this book is the first english language monograph on this key figure and also includes the first translation without the syriac of this compelling metrical homily into english which has at its heart the public pronouncement by a parrot of theological truths the authors situate this remarkable text in the wider fields of performance studies animal studies and media studies all areas that can illuminate essential meanings and implications of the homily

discover how ordinary beings a deer a robber a monkey a parrot and more make up the past lives of the buddha before he was buddha the jataka tales are ancient buddhist stories found in both the pali canon and sanskrit tradition recounting the many past lives and ongoing spiritual work of shakyamuni buddha on his way to his final birth as siddhartha gautama in them we find the buddha facing difficulties making tough choices doing hard work falling down and getting back up the kind of continuing effort of spiritual practice that all beings face before buddha was buddha focuses on a selection of particular jataka tales in which the buddha in past lives faces temptations and struggles with self doubt as well as his own shortcomings in these tales he s not beyond life s messes its challenges and disasters but is down in the mix trudging through the mud with the rest of us each story presented in brief is followed by a commentary pointing to its relevance to our lives and practice realization today

in archaeological and visual sources of meditation in the ancient monasteries of $ku\square a$ angela f howard and giuseppe vignato use diverse methodological approaches from archaeology art history and religious studies to reconstruct monastic life and practices in the rock monasteries on the northern silk route ca 200 650 analysis of the caves function meditation manuals and the cave murals highlights the centrality of meditation a fundamental duty of $ku\square a$ monastics this interdisciplinary study utilizes hitherto unpublished line drawings maps and photographs to reconstruct and interpret the architecture and $d\square cor$ of $ku\square a$ caves thus revealing the close links between the spiritual and the physical between doctrinal teaching and practice and the lay out and $d\square cor$ of the monasteries

this collection examines the topic of time in the life and works of augustine of hippo adopting a global perspective on time as a philosophical and theological problem the volume includes reflections on the meaning of history the mortality of human bodies and the relationship between temporal experience and linguistic expression as augustine himself once observed time is both familiar and surprisingly strange everyone s days are structured by temporal rhythms and routines from watching the clock to whiling away the hours at work few of us however take the time to sit down and figure out whether time is real or not or how it is we are able to hold our past present and future thoughts together in a straight line so that we can recite a prayer or sing a song divided into five sections the essays collected here highlight the ongoing relevance of augustine s work even in settings quite distinct from his own era and context the first three sections organized around the themes of interpretation language and gendered embodiment engage directly with augustine s own writings from the confessions to the city of god and beyond the final two sections meanwhile explore the afterlife of the augustinian approach in conversation with medieval islamic and christian thinkers like avicenna and aquinas as well as a broad range of buddhist figures like dharmakirti and vasubandhu what binds all of these diverse chapters together is the underlying sense that regardless of the century or the tradition in which we find ourselves there is something about the puzzle of temporality that refuses to go away time as augustine knew demands our attention this was true for him in late ancient north africa it was also true for buddhist thinkers in south and east asia and it remains just as true for humankind in the twenty first century as people around the globe continue to grapple with the reality of time and the challenges of living in a world that always seems to be to be speeding up rather than slowing down
