this open access book presents an account of five teacher educators who over a two year period undertook a research project with five teachers of languages other than english in pre secondary schools in new zealand their collaborative aim was to develop students intercultural capability in the context of learning a new language the school participants were typical of many in new zealand s pre secondary sector the teachers had limited language teaching experience and limited prior knowledge of how to develop the intercultural dimension in their language classrooms and the students were largely at the beginning stages of learning a new language the book discusses the findings obtained using a range of data collection methods including classroom observations reflective interviews with teachers and focus groups with students it documents instances of breakthrough and growth for teachers and students and reveals the problems and tensions lastly it reflects on the lessons learned in the course of this project and speculates on the roles that teacher education needs to play if the goal of intercultural capability is to be better achieved in language classrooms both in new zealand and internationally of interest to a wide range of stakeholders in the area of education the book allows readers to gain an understanding of the opportunities of working with teachers through an action research model alongside the challenges that this brings and ways in which intercultural capability may be strengthened

the population of english language learners has substantially grown over the years as such it is increasingly important to properly educate culturally diverse students in such a manner that promotes inclusion and global acceptance intercultural responsiveness in the second language learning classroom is an essential reference source for the latest research on the importance of multicultural professional development for the progression of educating a diverse student population featuring expansive coverage across a broad range of topics such as cultural bias self identity and language programs this publication is ideally designed for academicians researchers and students seeking current research on methods to solve the cultural incongruence between student and teacher

the authors set out to define the aims principles and objectives of recent research into what exactly happens in the language classroom to describe the findings of this work and to relate these to teaching practice

new information but also acquires new language skills. Grabe identifies effective approaches for reading and determines that good readers need rapid and automatic word recognition skills, a large recognition of vocabulary, sound knowledge of syntactic structure and discourse organization and metacognitive awareness of reading purposes and text comprehension. Successful readers are those who use learning strategies effectively. Academic reading requires the development of strategic reading. Readers have to be aware of their goals in reading and be able to administer strategies effectively. These strategies are to be chosen carefully depending on their purpose in reading. Only then will the reader be able to check his/her understanding of the text and solve comprehension problems successfully. Out of the various aspects of teaching reading to second language (L2) learners in a classroom setting, the present essay will focus on metacognitive reading strategies. First, the question will be answered what is meant by the term metacognitive reading strategies. A definition will be presented, then the essay provides a theoretic framework of metacognitive reading strategies before reading, while reading and after reading. Finally, there will be two examples of how metacognitive reading strategies can be taught in a classroom setting.
