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this book presents a series of illuminating studies which conclusively demonstrates that the prevailing conception of historical linguistics is deeply flawed most linguists today believe that there is no good evidence that the indo european family of languages is related to any other language family or even any other language in like manner the new world is deemed to contain hundreds of language families among which there are no apparent links furthermore it is claimed there are no known connections between the languages of the old world and those of the americas and finally the strongest belief of all is that there is no trace of genetic affinity nor could there be among the world s language families the author argues that all of these firmly entrenched and vigorously defended beliefs are false that they are myths propagated by a small group of scholars who have failed to understand the true basis of genetic affinity twentieth century indo europeanists though not their nineteenth century forebears have confused the issue of genetic affinity which derives from classification with such traditional concerns of historical linguistics as reconstruction and sound correspondences once it is recognized that taxonomy or classification must precede these traditional concerns the apparent conflict between the traditional view and that of joseph greenberg and his followers is seen to be illusory and finally a comparison of all the world s languages in this new perspective leaves little doubt that all extant human languages share a common origin

this introductory textbook provides readers with a foundation in methods for analysing and understanding language from various theoretical perspectives within linguistics and language studies its novel approach introduces systemic functional linguistics text and discourse analysis and formal approaches to linguistics it demonstrates applications of these approaches to reveal how we use language in society how our brains process language and how we learn language topics include phonetics phonology conversation analysis morphology semantics functional and formal syntax text linguistics genre analysis evaluative lexis in text multimodal representations of meaning language change and variation animals and language the brain and language and first and second language development acquisition the main language focused on is english while other languages are also drawn on to illustrate the principles models and theories learning outcomes exercises with answer key ideas for project work and questions for reflection are

provided throughout a final chapter gathers explanations of various fields of practice within linguistics written by linguists from around the world including david crystal clinical linguistics frances christie educational linguistics and malcolm coulthard forensic linguistics an introduction to linguistics and language studies offers an array of analytical tools for undergraduate students of language communication and education and provides an overview of the field for those interested in further study in linguistics and applied language studies readers will come away with a heightened sensitivity to and appreciation of their own and other s use of language for creating meaning and for interaction

the question of language origin has fascinated people for years traditionally humanists like linguists and philosophers attempted to solve it with limited success in the last decades however the sciences have begun to study the same question seemingly with more success this book is the result of the activities of a group of scholars members of the language origins society who approach the problem not only from the viewpoint of linguistics but also from that of anatomy physiology social sciences physical anthropology paleoanthropology paleontology comparative zoology general biology ethology evolutionary biology and psychology the volume thus clearly reflects the interdisciplinary approach the language origins society is advocating since this book is the first of a series meant for the general scholar it attempts to avoid specialist jargon hence it is equally useful for student courses in linguistics social sciences communication science ethology evolutionary biology and speech therapy

this volume examines the notion of criticality in language studies drawing on the work of the frankfurt school adorno habermas horkheimer and marcuse among others the chapters in the volume examine a variety of linguistic contexts from gender activism to web journalism from the classroom to the open streets it also presents theoretical and methodological guidelines to researchers interested in expanding their critical outlook for meaning brought on by the notion of criticality in contemporary language studies understanding criticality in languages through historical political and social perspectives using linguistics and language studies as tools to dissect and disclose social injustices this book will be of great interest to scholars and researchers of language studies and linguistics philosophy politics and sociology and social policy

the field of applied linguistics covers a diverse range of research and practice and has developed somewhat differently in various parts of the world due to variations in local socio cultural conditions needs and issues however this local diversity does not reflect a field that is incoherent but rather one which has a broad shared international agenda which is invigorated by the diversity brought to the field by local perspectives the papers in this volume represent some of the major global directions that research in applied linguistics is taking and shed light on how language is used to affect practice the aim of this volume is to explore some of the key methods and issues which are guiding applied linguistics into the future through an examination of these issues in local contexts thereby providing a basis for understanding the global directions the field is taking these directions follow two historically defined paths those related to educational studies and language teaching and those related to social issues involving language in the volume half the papers focus on the former examining issues of language teaching language teacher education and second language acquisition while the other half examine social issues related to language use bilingualism and multilingualism and language policy and planning the collection of papers presented in this book illustrates how these traditional themes are influenced by the rising forces of globalisation and the use of technology thus exemplifying both the new and old ways in which the study of language is realised

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
