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ambedkar pioneered new strategies philosophically and practically which continue to prove effective to india s untouchable community this text focuses on his key roles as statesman politician social theorist and activist

this collection of essays spans the history of the movement from its nineteenth century roots to the most recent growth of dalit literature and includes the political developments and the buddhist conversion in all 16 essays are collected in the volume they are thematically divided into four different parts viz background politics religion and dalit literature

this major new book focuses on ambedkar as a social theorist as a statesman and politician and as an opponent of caste hinduism and advocate of buddhism as a method of release from hindu social oppression

essays on untouchables and untouchability by b r ambedkar essays on untouchables and untouchability by b r ambedkar philosophy religious political terms untouchability is a status of certain social groups confined to menial and despised jobs it is associated with the hindu caste system but similar groups exist outside hinduism for example the burakumin in japan and the hutu and twa in rwanda at the beginning of the twenty first century there were over 160 million untouchables on the indian subcontinent the british had granted special political representation to the untouchables and also started a system of reservations in government jobs in the early 1940s the scheduled castes became politically distinct under the leadership of bhimrao ramji ambedkar ambedkar who converted from hinduism to buddhism at the end of his life in 1956 held that the untouchables had been buddhists isolated and despised when brahmanism became dominant about the fourth century while ambedkar supported by the british pursued all means of securing special rights for untouchables gandhi opposed those measures as too divisive condemning untouchability without renouncing varna hinduism

ambedkar s struggle against untouchability striving for an equal society is a nonfiction work that examines dr b r ambedkar s lifelong fight against the caste based practice of untouchability in india combining historical analysis biographical insights and sociological perspectives the book explores his relentless advocacy for social equality human dignity and legal reforms to protect marginalized communities it highlights ambedkar s efforts to challenge entrenched social hierarchies mobilize oppressed groups

bhimrao ramji ambedkar 1891 1956 indian statesman and social reformer

one of twentieth century india s great polymaths statesmen and militant philosophers of equality b r ambedkar spent his life battling untouchability and instigating the end of the caste system in his 1948 book the untouchables he sought to trace the origin of the dalit caste beef brahmins and broken men is an annotated selection from this work just as relevant now when the oppression of and discrimination against dalits remains pervasive ambedkar offers a deductive and at times a speculative history to propose a genealogy of untouchability he contends that modern day dalits are descendants of those buddhists who were fenced out of caste society and rendered untouchable by a resurgent brahminism since the fourth century bce the brahmins whose vedic cult originally involved the sacrifice of cows adapted buddhist ahimsa and vegetarianism to stigmatize outcaste buddhists who were consumers of beef the outcastes were soon relegated to the lowliest of occupations and prohibited from participation in civic life to unearth this lost history ambedkar undertakes a forensic examination of a wide range of brahminic

literature heavily annotated with an emphasis on putting ambedkar and recent scholarship into conversation beef brahmins and broken men assumes urgency as india witnesses unprecedented violence against dalits and muslims in the name of cow protection

in a sensitive and compelling account of the lives of those at the very bottom of indian society oliver mendelsohn and marika vicziany explore the construction of the untouchables as a social and political category the historical background which led to such a definition and their position in india today the authors argue that despite efforts to ameliorate their condition on the part of the state a considerable edifice of discrimination persists on the basis of a tradition of ritual subordination even now therefore it still makes sense to categorise these people as â untouchables the book promises to make a major contribution to the social and economic debates on poverty while its wide ranging perspectives will ensure an interdisciplinary readership from historians of south asia to students of politics economics religion and sociology

exploring the enduring legacy of untouchability in india this book challenges the ways in which the indian experience has been represented in western scholarship the authors introduce the long tradition of dalit emancipatory struggle and present a sustained critique of academic discourse on the dynamics of caste in indian society case studies complement these arguments underscoring the perils and problems that dalits face in a contemporary context of communalized politics and market reforms

this book examines the transformation of untouchability into a political idea in india during the first half of the twentieth century at its heart is ambedkar s role and the concepts he used to champion untouchability as a political problem ambedkar s main

objective was to comprehend the numerous avatars of untouchability in order to eradicate this practice ambedkar understood untouchability beyond aspects of ritual purity and pollution by stressing its complex nature and uncovering the political historical racial spatial and emotional characteristics contained in this concept ambedkar believed the abolition of untouchability depended on a widespread alteration of india s political economic and cultural systems ambedkar reframed the problem of untouchability by linking it to larger concepts floating in the political environment of late colonial india such as representation slavery race the indian village internationalism and even the creation of pakistan

for the solution of the caste question buddha is not enough ambedkar is not enough either marx is a must this is neither buddha s biography nor ambedkar s further it is not marx s biography either this is a discussion concerning the dalit question based exclusively on ambedkar s writings however i have confined myself only to those writings that deal with the dalit question and caste system ambedkar had also discussed other issues like division of labour division of labourers poverty unemployment and economic exploitation these issues are connected with the dalit question and the caste system hence all these issues find place in this book ambedkar had also written on other themes like the problem of the rupee and large scale industry but i have not included those issues which are not directly connected with the dalit question even regarding gandhi i have not considered issues other than those ambedkar cited in connection with the dalit question for the purpose of this essay i wanted to rely only on ambedkar s writings but in couple of contexts where i could not find relevant information in ambedkar s works i had to turn to a few references from his biographies i have given these details in the respective contexts the world needs the theory that is powerful enough to illuminate the path it is irrelevant whether that theoretician is buddha marx ambedkar or someone else that

which remedies the disease alone is a medicine that which emancipates from sufferings alone is the higher path if it is buddhism we are obliged to follow it to revere it the question however is to ascertain which is the higher path this is the thing which we must ascertain we are obliged to follow the thing which we ascertain to be the higher path we need to read ambedkar s writings in order to arrive at a correct understanding of many issues which he discussed the caste system untouchability poverty buddhism marxism etc we have to read them carefully and seriously whatever we read we have to take everything that is useful we have to follow it we have to correct whatever needs correction we have to abandon whatever is not useful to do all this however we must first understand ambedkar s ideas correctly problems like castes and untouchability are not things that have arisen so to speak yesterday or today they have been entrenched for thousands of years but we don t have any written literature other than religious texts and some inscriptions that tell about them the available sources may not be useful in many contexts yet they may be useful to some extent in some contexts when we don t find clear cut bases for the problems however there is no way out except attempting to understand them by means of our own logic

introspection on the part of indian leadership in the 19th century lead to concentrated efforts to ameliorate the condition of the untouchables

this book addresses the problem of untouchability by providing an overview of the subject as well as penetrating insights into its social and religious origins the author persuasively demonstrates that untouchability is a deeply ambiguous condition neither inside nor outside society reviled yet indispensable untouchables constitute an original category of social exclusion the situation of

untouchables is crucial to the understanding of caste dynamics especially in contemporary circumstances but emphasis particularly within anthropology has been placed on the dominant aspects of the caste system rather than on those marginalized and excluded from it this book redresses this problem and represents a vital contribution to studies of india hinduism human rights sociology and anthropology jacket

the book analyses political and social transition at the juncture of indian independence in 1947 from the british to indians with a view of dalits who got initial emancipation under the british rule from hindu varna system and brahmanical tyranny the book highlights the issues of untouchability mahar movement mahatma gandhi mahatma phule and dr b r ambedkar

although gandhi has been the subject of hundreds of books and an oscar winning film there has been no sustained study of his engagement with major figures in the indian independence movement who were often his critics from 1920 1948 this book fills that gap by examining the strengths and weaknesses of gandhi s contribution to india as evidenced in the letters speeches and newspaper articles focused on the dialogue debate between gandhi and jawaharlal nehru rabindranath tagore sri aurobindo bhim rao ambedkar annie besant and c f andrews the book also covers key groups within india that gandhi sought to incorporate into his independence movement the hindu right muslims christians and sikhs and analyzes gandhi s ambiguous stance regarding the hindi urdu question and its impact on the independence struggle

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
