defined as an ecological epoch in which humans have the most impact on the environment the anthropocene poses challenging questions to literary and cultural studies if in the anthropocene the distinction between nature and culture increasingly collapses we have to rethink our division between historiography and natural history as well as notions of the subject and of agency since the enlightenment this anthology collects papers from literary and cultural studies that address

various issues surrounding the topic even though the new epoch seems to require a collective self understanding as a unified species readings of the anthropocene and conceptualizations of human nature relationships largely differ in anglophone literatures and cultures these differing perspectives are reflected in the structure of this book which is divided into five separate sections the introductory part familiarizes the reader with the concept and the challenges it poses for the humanities in general and for literary and cultural studies in particular and the three following sections combine broader more theoretical essays with in depth critical readings of us canadian and australian representations of the anthropocene in literature the final part moves beyond literature to include media theoretical perspectives and discussions of photography and cinema in the anthropocene

exploring environmental literature from a feminist perspective this volume presents a diversity of feminist ecocritical approaches to affirm the continuing contributions relevance and necessity of a feminist perspective in environmental literature culture and science feminist ecocriticism has a substantial history with roots in second and third wave feminist literary criticism women s environmental writing and social change activisms and eco cultural critique and yet both feminist and ecofeminist literary perspectives have been marginalized the essays in this collection build on the belief that the repertoire of violence conceptual and literal toward nature and women comprising our daily lives must become central to our ecocritical discussions and that basic literacy in theories about ethics are fundamental to these discussions the book offers an international collection of scholarship that includes ecocritical theory literary criticism and ecocultural analyses bringing a diversity of perspectives in terms of gender sexuality and race reconnecting with the histories of feminist and ecofeminist literary criticism and utilizing new developments in postcolonial ecocriticism animal studies queer theory feminist and gender studies cross cultural and international ecocriticism this timely volume develops a continuing and international feminist ecocritical perspective on literature language and culture

postcolonial literatures of climate change investigates the evolving nature of postcolonial literary criticism in response to global regional and local environmental transformations brought about by climate change it builds upon and extends previous studies in postcolonial ecocriticism to demonstrate how the growing awareness of human caused global warming has begun to permeate literary consciousness praxis and analysis the breadth of the volume s coverage the diversity of its focal locations

winner of the american association for italian studies book prize 2016 written by one of europe s leading critics ecocriticism and italy reads the diverse landscapes of italy in the cultural imagination from death in venice as a literary trope and petrochemical curse through the volcanoes of naples to wine food and environmental violence in piedmont serenella iovino explores italy as a text where ecology and imagination meet examining cases where justice society and politics interlace with stories of land and life pollution and redemption the book argues that literature art and criticism are able to transform the unexpressed voices of these suffering worlds into stories of resistance and practices of liberation

this book traces shifting attitudes towards science and technology nature and the environment in twentieth century germany it approaches them through discussion of a range of literary texts largely new to english readers in which practical environmental problems and underlying issues of ecological ethics are brought to life in often semi autobiographical narratives it explores the philosophical influences on them and their political contexts and asks what part novels and plays poems and essays have played in environmental debate technological disasters living in the landscape hunting and allotment gardens are

among the topics discussed

along with humans and animals ghosts populate the pages of contemporary anglophone novels analysing novels from across the world including australia nigeria south africa india and jamaica this book explores how these ghosts can help readers to perceive difficult to visualise environmental threats and access marginalised environmental knowledge instead of prompting fear these hauntings foster understanding across species and generations to enable inclusive formulations of environmental justice drawing on the latest work in postcolonial ecocriticism hauntology and environmental philosophy and such literary texts as *Graceland* *No Telephone to Heaven* *The Rock Alphabet* and *The Ministry of Utmost Happiness* *Ecospectrality* is an essential read for anyone working in the environmental humanities today

environmental writing is an increasingly popular literary genre and a multifaceted genre at that recently dominated by works of new nature writing environmental writing includes works of poetry and fiction about the world around us in the last two decades universities have begun to offer environmental writing modules and courses with the intention of teaching students skills in the field of writing inspired by the natural world this book asks how students are being guided into writing about environments informed by independently conducted interviews with educators and a review of existing pedagogical guides it explores recurring instructions given to students for writing about the environment and compares these pedagogical approaches to the current theory and practice of ecocriticism by scholars such as Ursula Heise and Timothy Morton proposing a set of original pedagogical exercises influenced by ecocriticism the book draws on a number of self reflexive environmentally conscious poets including Juliana Spahr Jorie Graham and Les Murray as creative and stimulating models for teachers and students

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
