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in the 1980s the need for long term care for elderly people in western societies was quite obvious from the increasing numbers of old and very old people in the population countries had responded in a number of different ways to cope with this need originally published in 1985 the central theme of this book is to explore these different ways and to probe beneath the surface level of institutions and specific programs beneath this level are a number of layers of care consisting of attitudes beliefs and values on a social as well as personal level thus chapters two to six explore the surface level of services goods treatments institutions etc provided in different countries for long term care chapter seven looks at another layer the role of government chapter eight at ethical issues of human rights and chapter nine at the base layer the views of elderly people themselves the book draws mainly on information from the uk usa germany and scandinavia and will be of interest to all concerned with the health and social welfare of the elderly

the number of elderly people relying on formal long term care services is dramatically increasing year after year and the challenge of ensuring the quality and financial stability of care provision is one faced by governments in both the developed and developing world this edited book is the first to provide a comprehensive international survey of long term care provision and regulation built around a series of case studies from europe north

america and asia the analytical framework allows the different approaches that countries have adopted to be compared side by side and readers are encouraged to consider which quality assurance approaches might best meet their own country s needs wider issues underpinning the need to regulate the quality of long term care are also discussed this timely book is a valuable resource for policymakers working in the health care sector researchers and students taking graduate courses on health policy and management

long term care is an increasingly important issue in many contemporary welfare states around the globe given ageing populations this ground breaking book provides detailed case studies of 11 eu member states welfare regimes within europe to show how welfare states organize structures and deliver long term care and whether there is a social investment perspective in the delivery of long term care this perspective is important because the effect of demographic transitions is often used as an argument for the existence of economic pressure on welfare states and a need for either direct retrenchment or attempts to reduce welfare state spending the book s chapters will look specifically into how different welfare states have focussed on long term care in recent years and what type of changes have taken place with regard to ageing populations and ambitions to curb increases in public sector spending in this area they describe the development in long term care for the elderly after the financial crisis and also discuss the boundaries between state and civil society in the different welfare states approaches to the delivery of care

this book uses a revised version of kingdon s multiple streams framework to examine health financing reforms in china hong kong taiwan and the republic of korea rok as well as long term care insurance ltcu reforms in japan and singapore it shows that the explanatory power of the multiple streams framework can be strengthened through enriching the concepts of policy entrepreneurs ideas and windows of opportunity in the original framework as well as bringing the theoretical lens of historical institutionalism into the framework

the case studies focus on the emergence extent and nature of national policies on ageing and associated strategies to address long term care needs key opportunities for constraints on policy are identified in this first round of regional studies written by prominent researchers in hong kong korea malaysia singapore

life expectancy is increasing in many parts of the world and more are also being enabled to live with disabling conditions that once might have been

fatal people who are chronically ill have serious disabilities have hiv aids are mentally ill or victims of accidents and disasters or elderly many will need continuing care and support and these numbers will grow how best to meet these needs is getting more attention such care is not to just look after the sick but to enable those with long term illnesses or disabilities to live their lives as fully as possible institutionalization is often not the best way of care and the home where the patient lives with family members and friends nearby is often more appropriate this report examines the options highlighting the clear benefits of home based care whilst being aware of the needs of the carers in the home the report stresses it is time for health systems to take responsibility for providing caregivers in families and communities with the support they both need and to bring greater benefit to the patient

the aging of society is a growing concern in all advanced nations and at the forefront of concern is long term care for frail older people enactment of a new public long term care insurance program by the japanese government in 1997 provided an excellent opportunity for a conference focusing on an ideal long term care system for frail older people with contributions from the fields of medicine nursing social work gerontology political science economics and sociology this volume provides an overview of key problems and possible solutions in programs for frail older people from a unique international perspective

key policy issues in long term care are diverse and complex and the numbers of persons needing such care continue to increase demographic and epidemiological transitions will result in dramatic changes in the health needs of the world s populations everywhere there is a steep increase in the need for long term care lte these trends reflect two interrelated processes one is the growth in factors that increase the prevalence of long term disability in the population the second is the change in the capacity of the informal support system to address these needs both of these processes enhance the urgency for public policies to address the consequences of these changes the growing need for ltc policies is generally associated with industrialized countries what is less widely acknowledged is that long term care needs are increasing in the developing world at a rate that far exceeds that experienced by industrialized countries moreover the developing world is experiencing increases in ltc needs at levels

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
