characters Example The Catcher in the Rye is told from Holden Caulfields firstperson perspective while Pride and Prejudice utilizes a thirdperson omniscient point of view

Tone The authors attitude towards the subject matter conveyed through word choice sentence structure and imagery Example The tone in Edgar Allan Poes works is often dark gothic and suspenseful

Symbolism The use of objects characters or events to represent abstract ideas or concepts Example The mockingbird in To Kill a Mockingbird symbolizes innocence and goodness

Figurative Language Literary devices that enhance meaning and create vivid imagery including metaphors similes personification and hyperbole Example The rain lashed against the windows personification
