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k inig rother salman und morolf the minchner oswald and grauer rock otherwise known as orendel have had a troubled position in the literary history of medieval germany forced into a normative generic framework as either minstrel epic spielmannsepik or bridal quest epic brautwerbungsepik these texts have been viewed conventionally according to an essentially teleological classification or a schematic ideal bowden challenges the premises of such a view with a detailed history of the textual scholarship and revaluates these so called bridal quests on their own terms offering detailed and suggestive readings of each work without the distortions or limitations inherent in the traditional interpretative model sarah bowden is powys roberts research fellow at st hugh s college oxford

this book presents the first collection of the earliest west germanic bridal quest narratives together with a comparative study of them in contrast to earlier studies the author locates the origin of this narrative tradition in the oral and written germanic literary tradition a result that leads to a re assessment of the genesis of vernacular german and scandinavian literature the chapters deal in chronological order with the latin chronicles of the germanic peoples and with the early latin and vernacular literature in germany and scandinavia

with full page maps and supplementary photos this encyclopedia covers every aspect of scandinavia during the middle ages including rulers and saints overviews of the countries religion education politics and law culture and material life history literature and art

by the early middle ages vernacular aristocratic traditions of heroic narration were firmly established in western and northern europe although there are regional linguistic and formal differences one can observe a number of similarities oral literature disseminates a range of themes that are shared by narratives in most parts of the continent in all the european regions this tradition of heroic narration came into contact with christianity which led to modifications similar processes of adaptation and transformation can be traced everywhere in this field of early european vernacular narrative but with the increasing specialization of academic fields over the last half century inter disciplinary dialogue has become increasingly difficult the volume is a contribution to renew the inter disciplinary dialogue about common themes topics and motifs in nordic roman anglo saxon and germanic literature and about the different methodologies to explore them

chastity as a topic is an ideal interdisciplinary consideration since it accesses iconographical representation the philosophical issues of purity morality and of innocence the legal issues of loss and punishment the historical issues of celibacy and the legislation that topic evoked as well as the role of chastity as a literary topos in late antiquity as well as the middle ages for example in medieval commentary traditions and within medieval vernacular literatures the topic of chastity as well as its opposing characteristics thus provides an arena for a discussion of the transmission of ovid and the commentaries this author provoked in the middle ages the interpretation of images illustrating legal texts cross cultural enquiries such as the reciprocity between christian muslim and judaic interpretations of temperance continence and abstinence and the theological legal issue of god s rights in excising adam and eve from the garden of eden contributors nancy van deusen frank t coulson marcia I colish uta renate blumenthal th \Box r \Box se anne druart claudia bornholdt susan I engle cristian gaspar and rafael chodos

the centrality of the cult of saints to medieval christianity is reflected in surviving liturgical historical literary and administrative texts material culture and architecture too often however disciplinary boundaries mean these sources are studied in isolation from one another this volume takes a multi disciplinary approach to uncover both the mechanisms by which saints cults spread and also the manner in which veneration of the saints drove other forms of political cultural and social expression focussed on the cult of oswald of northumbria in the high middle ages this volume brings together historians literary scholars musicologists and art historians to explore the cult of saints through texts objects space sound and the senses and particularly interrogates the influence of liturgy on society oswald s cult spread far in time and space from its origins in seventh century northumbria and the essays in this volume seek to understand how liturgical commemoration and celebration of oswald in different times and places drove developments in cultural expression initiating new styles in musical as well as visual and material art forms

the epic fragments of waldere yield some of the earliest lore concerning migration period heroes such as attila the hun theodoric the ostrogoth walter son of lfhere and gunthe and hagen of the nibelungs while at the same time expressing political concerns that the viking age poet shared with his audience imagery and themes such as armaments and the worthiness of warriors to bear them point to the climax of walter s victory over gulhere in single combat a duel presenting an ethical dilemma for hagen as indicated in both of the extant leaves this critical edition resolves some long standing textual cruces while also providing background on old english heroism weapons and versification

the first comprehensive account of old icelandic literature set within its social and cultural context

draws on old norse literary heritage to explore questions of emotion as both a literary motif and as a social phenomenon authors throughout history have relied on the emotional make up of their readers and audiences to make sense of the behaviours and actions of fictive characters but how can a narrative voice contained in a text evoke feelings that are ultimately never real or actual but a figment of a text a fictive reality created out of words how does one reconcile interiority a presumed modern

conceptualisation with medieval emotionality the volume seeksto address these questions it positions itself within the larger context of the history of emotion offering a novel approach to the study of literary representations of emotionality and its staging through voice performativityand narrative manipulation probing how emotions are encoded in texts the author argues that the deceptively laconic portrayal of emotion in the icelandic sagas and other literature reveals an emotive script that favours reticence over expressivity and exposes a narrative convention of emotional subterfuge through narrative silences and the masking of emotion focusing on the ambivalent borders between prose and poetic language she suggests that poeticvocalisation may provide a literary space within which emotive interiority can be expressed the volume considers a wide range of old norse materials from translated romances through eddic poetry and selendingas gur sagas of icelanders to indigenous romance sif rikhardsdottir is professor of comparative literature at the university of iceland and vice chair of the institute of research in literature and visual arts

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
