**Engaging ESL Activities for the Past Continuous Tense**

1. **Storytelling with Then and Now** Objective: Practice using the past continuous and simple past tense together in a narrative.

**Activity** Divide students into pairs. One partner describes an action that was happening in the past using the past continuous eg I was walking to school when. The other partner completes the story using the simple past tense eg I saw a dog running towards me. Switch roles and repeat the activity.

**2 What Were You Doing RolePlay** **Objective** Use the past continuous tense in spontaneous conversation and ask questions about past actions.

**Activity** Divide students into pairs or small groups. Assign each group a scenario such as A group of friends at a party, A family preparing for a holiday, A group of coworkers brainstorming ideas. Have the students roleplay the scenario using the past continuous tense to describe they were doing at different points in time.

**3 Freeze Frame RolePlay with Action Verbs** **Objective** Develop visual understanding of ongoing actions and practice using the past continuous tense to describe them.

**3 Activity** Select a group of action verbs associated with specific situations eg running, swimming, cooking, playing. Write the verbs on slips of paper and distribute them to students. Each student silently performs their action in front of the class. After a few moments ask students to freeze in their action. Have a student describe what the frozen classmates were doing using the past continuous tense eg swimming and John was running.

**4 Where Were You Past Continuous Puzzle** **Objective** Develop spatial awareness and practice using the past continuous tense in a specific location context.

**Activity** Prepare a simple map or diagram of a familiar location eg a classroom, a park, a house. Create puzzle pieces with different locations marked on them eg in the library, at the playground, in the kitchen. Students work in pairs or small groups to match the puzzle pieces with the correct locations on the map. Have students describe what they were doing at each location using the past continuous tense eg I was reading in the library. They were playing on the playground.

**5 Whats Wrong Picture Description** **Objective** Observe and interpret visual information using the past continuous tense to describe an unusual situation.

**Activity** Show students a picture depicting a scene with something unusual happening eg a cat wearing a hat, a car driving on a sidewalk. Ask students to describe the picture using the past continuous tense focusing on the unusual detail. Example: The cat was wearing a hat while sitting on the couch.

**6 Past Continuous Storytime Interactive Game** **Objective** Develop vocabulary and practice using the past continuous tense in a storytelling context.

**4 Activity** Use a deck of picture cards or create your own with different images depicting actions eg playing, eating, reading, dancing. Show a picture card to the class. Students take turns adding sentences to a story using the past continuous tense incorporating the image shown eg The boy was eating ice cream when. The girl was dancing when. Continue until the story reaches a logical conclusion.

**7 Past Continuous News Report Creative Writing** **Objective** Develop

writing skills and practice using the past continuous tense in a journalistic context **Activity 7** News Report Writing Objective Develop students' writing skills and practice using the past continuous tense in a journalistic context **Activity** Divide students into pairs or small groups Assign each group a topic for a news report such as a traffic accident a natural disaster or a sporting event Students work together to write a news report about the event using the past continuous tense to describe the actions and events that were happening Encourage students to be creative and use descriptive language

**8 Time Traveler Journaling** Objective Develop imaginative writing skills and practice using the past continuous tense in a personal context **Activity** Ask students to imagine they are time travelers visiting a historical event Have them write a journal entry describing what they were seeing hearing and feeling using the past continuous tense eg I was standing in the crowd when The soldiers were marching when Students can share their journal entries with the class

**9 Past Continuous Board Game** Interactive Learning Objective Practice using the past continuous tense in a game setting and develop strategic thinking skills **Activity** 5 Create a simple board game with different squares representing actions eg playing soccer eating dinner reading a book Students take turns rolling a die and moving their game pieces around the board When a player lands on a square they must describe an action they were doing at that time using the past continuous tense eg I was playing soccer when I rolled a six The first player to reach the end of the board wins

**10 Past Continuous Memory Match** Vocabulary Enhancement Objective Enhance vocabulary related to daily routines and practice using the past continuous tense in a memory game **Activity** Prepare sets of cards with pairs of pictures or words depicting actions eg sleeping reading Shuffle the cards and lay them face down on a table Students take turns flipping over two cards at a time If the cards match they keep the pair If the cards don't match they are flipped back over Students must describe the actions on the matched cards using the past continuous tense eg I found the reading card and the sleeping card I was reading when I fell asleep
