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offers a comprehensive thematic introduction to a wide range of medieval writings about the outlaw hero from a series of different historical perspectives by the fifteenth century churchmen were complaining that laypeople preferred to hear stories about robin hood rather than to listen to the word of god but what was the attraction of this outlaw for contemporary audiences the essays collected here seek to examine the outlaw's legend in relation to late medieval society politics and piety they set out the different types of evidence which give us access to representations of robin and his men in the pre reformation period ask whether stories about the outlaw had any basis in reality and explore the many different purposes for which his legend was adapted the volume is divided into six parts the sources for the medieval legend of robin hood and its origins social structure social conflict kingship law and warfare piety and the church and the outlaw's legend in wales and scotland key issues addressed by its essays include the dating of the surviving tales attitudes to social hierarchy representations of gender and masculinity the extent to which the tales drew upon or shaped contemporary attitudes towards law and justice the development of robin hood plays and games and whether the legend emerged from or appealed to particular social groups it not only sheds new light on a character who whether real or not is one of the most important and memorable figures in the history of medieval england but also explores the extent to which the outlaw became popular in scotland and wales

while references to robin hood began to appear as early as the thirteenth century in legal records the earliest surviving poems did not appear in manuscripts and early printed books until the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries several fourteenth century allusions in the works of william langland and geoffrey chaucer suggest that the rymes of robyn hood were widely circulating by the 1370s but it is vital to note none of these late fourteenth century works survives a better approach thomas h ohlgren argues is to focus on what has actually survived rather than on what might have existed as a result the poems robin hood and the monk and robin hood and the potter which survive in two different cambridge manuscripts of the last third of the fifteenth century and a lytell geste of robyn hode which was printed at least seven times in the sixteenth century must receive pride of place in the canon because they have a physical reality as material artifacts in short they exist and provide valuable information about the places and times of their composition and dissemination

following in the tradition of recent work by cultural geographers and historians of maps this collection examines the apparently familiar figure of robin hood as he can be located within spaces that are geographical cultural and temporal the volume is divided into two sections the first features an interrogation of the literary and other textually transmitted spaces to uncover the critical grounds in which the robin hood legend has traditionally operated the essays in part two take up issues related to performative and experiential space demonstrating the reciprocal relationship between page stage and lived experience throughout the volume the contributors contend with among other things modern theories of gender literary detective work and the ways in which the settings that once advanced court performances now include digital gaming and the enactment of real lives

first mentioned by william langland in the late fourteenth century robin hood comes down to us through ballads and folksongs old chronicles and plays medieval allusions folklore and place names today robin hood folk songs are found in the usa as well as in england and scotland and place names and traditions are widely located in england the earliest stories are centred on barnsdale in yorkshire but later the emphasis shifts to nottingham and sherwood forest originally a yeoman robin was upgraded to aristocrat in the sixteenth century but he remains essentially a champion of the poor and oppressed and a social nonconformer how far robin hood was based on a historical character and how far he is an archetypal outlaw or a greenwood myth who must withdraw from society and commune with nature is the subject of the doels wide ranging study this new edition is complete with an updated gazetteer of robin hood sites and an annotated filmography it includes almost 50 illustrations including performances by present day mummers

before stories of king arthur and robin hood were adapted and readapted for film television and theater radio scriptwriters looking for material turned to thomas malory s le morte darthur 1485 and howard pyle s the merry adventures of robin hood 1883 throughout the 1930s to the mid 1950s their legends inspired storylines for abbott and costello popeye let s pretend escape gunsmoke the adventures of superman and others many of these adaptations reflect the moral and ethical questions of the day as characters faced issues of gender relations divorce citizenship fascism crime and communism in a medieval setting

this collection of five tales and one play contains the definitive robin hood they are the earliest ballads and play and still the best of the bunch robin hood and the monk is the earliest surviving manuscript dated c 1450 and is considered the greatest of the ballads though it was probably not sung being described as a talkyng robin hood s death is one of the most satisfying tragedies in the english language while a lytell geste of robyn hode is a comprehensive account of the famous english outlaw complete unified and pointing quite clearly to the reign of edward ii as a probable time for an historical robin hood despite the opinions of most of the experts

the name of joseph ritson born in stockton on tees in 1752 will be familiar to very few people the name of robin hood is known the world over yet it was ritson whose research in the late eighteenth century ensured the survival of the robin hood legend he traveled all over the country looking for ancient manuscripts which told of the life and deeds of england s most famous outlaw without his efforts the legend of robin hood might have gone the way of other medieval outlaws such as adam bell famous in their day but not so much now yet this is not only a story about the formation of the robin hood legend ritson s story is one of rags to riches born in humble circumstances his aptitude for learning meant that he rose through society s ranks and became a successful lawyer local official and a gentleman however underneath the genteel and bourgeois façade of joseph ritson esq was a revolutionary having traveled to paris at the height of the french revolution he was captivated by the revolutionaries ideology of liberté egalité fraternité he returned to england as a true democrat who sought the abolition of the british monarchy and the rotten parliamentary system and wished for french revolution and its reign of terror to spread over to england this the history of the life and times of joseph ritson gentleman scholar and revolutionary
