the study of medieval literature has experienced a revolution in the last two decades which has reinvigorated many parts of the discipline and changed the shape of the subject in relation to the scholarship of the previous generation new texts laws and penitentials women s writing drama records innovative fields and objects of study the history of the book the study of space and the body medieval masculinities and original ways of studying them the sociology of the text performance studies have emerged this has brought fresh vigour and impetus to medieval studies and impacted significantly on cognate periods and areas the oxford handbook of medieval literature in english brings together the insights of these new fields and approaches with those of more familiar texts and methods of study to provide a comprehensive overview of the state of medieval literature today it also returns to first principles in posing fundamental questions about the nature scope and significance of the discipline and the directions that it might take in the next decade the handbook contains 44 newly commissioned essays from both world leading scholars and exciting new scholarly voices topics covered range from the canonical genres of saints lives sermons romance lyric poetry and heroic poetry major themes including monstrosity and marginality patronage and literary politics manuscript studies and vernacularity are investigated and there are close readings of key texts such as beowulf wulf and eadwacer and ancrene wisse and key authors from Ælfric to geoffrey chaucer langland and the gawain poet

key concepts in medieval literature introduces students to the major authors themes and genres of the english middle ages these are discussed in concise focused essays accompanied by summaries and recommendations for further reading highlighting the need to see texts in context both historically and linguistically

of the 15 essays in this book 11 have been published elsewhere between 1957 and 1981 they cover no single topic but range over a number of disparate texts and issues

this very short introduction provides a compelling account of the emergence of the earliest literature in britain and ireland including english welsh scottish irish anglo latin and anglo norman introducing the reader to some of the greatest poetry prose and drama ever written elaine

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an alphabetic guide to medieval literature covers important european writers influential works and literary terms and key topics during the years from 500 to 1500

simple forms is a study of popular or folk literature in the medieval period focusing both on the vast body of oral literature that lies behind the written texts which have survived from the medieval period and on the popular literature provided by literate authors for audiences of hearers or readers with varying degrees of literacy douglas gray leads new readers to a productively complicated understanding of the relationship between medieval popular culture and the culture of the learned he argues that medieval society was stratified in what seems to us a rigid way but that culturally it was more flexible literary topics themes and forms moved there was much borrowing and a constant interaction popular tales motifs and ideas passed into learned or courtly works learned forms and attitudes made their way in into popular culture all in all this seems to have been a fruitful symbiosis the book s twelve chapters are principally organised genre covering epics ballads popular romances folktales the german sage legends animal tales and fables proverbs riddles satires songs and drama

originally published in 1945 this book presents a discussion of medieval literature focusing to a large extent on french literature the text emphasises the fundamental differences between the medieval period and modern times most notably the changes engendered by the invention of print as noted in the introduction if a fair judgment is to be passed upon literary works belonging to the centuries before printing was invented some effort must be made to realise the extent of the prejudices under which we have grown up and to resist the involuntary demand that medieval literature must conform to our standards of taste or be regarded as of interest purely antiquarian this book will be of value to anyone with an interest in medieval literature and literary theory

the influence of medieval literature is instantly apparent in modern fantasy literature where knights and wizards populate castle strewn landscapes less obvious but still recognizable is the influence in science fiction which draws on medieval story structure and themes beyond these superficial similarities deeper connections become evident through an analysis of the literature's social function like the fantasy and science fiction of today the romances of the middle ages were written in times of extreme and prolonged social upheaval in all three genres the storytellers draw on the same archetypes the hero the quest the transformation for stories whose goal is to provide hope using jungian theory and comparative analysis this book explores the connections between the three genres it finds common ground among them in plots

that often reflect the recurring cycle of life and the elements of psychological rather than literal realism representative texts such as *Le Morte d'Arthur*, *The Witch World* series by Andre Norton and *More Than Human* by Theodore Sturgeon are examined in depth and the use of archetypes in each is thoroughly explored analysis reveals similarities in images structures and the pervasive belief that a perfectible universe is within man's capabilities if not now then someday

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
