Justice

This principle emphasizes fairness and equity in the distribution of health resources and benefits Public health interventions should strive to address health disparities and ensure that all members of the population have access to necessary services For example prioritizing access to healthcare for underserved communities is crucial for achieving health equity This principle fights against the unequal distribution of resources and opportunities 2 which often impacts marginalized populations disproportionately

Transparency and Accountability

Public health decisions should be transparent and accountable to the public This involves clear communication of information justifications for interventions and mechanisms for redress of grievances Openness in decisionmaking builds trust and facilitates community participation in public health initiatives

II Practical Applications

- 1 Identify the ethical issue Clearly define the conflict between ethical principles
- 2 Gather relevant information Collect all pertinent facts and data
- 3 Identify stakeholders Determine all individuals or groups affected by the decision
- 4 Consider different ethical perspectives Analyze the situation from multiple perspectives using different ethical frameworks utilitarian deontological virtue ethics
- 5 Explore potential options and their consequences Evaluate the potential benefits and harms of each course of action
- 3 6 Make a decision and justify it Document the decisionmaking process and rationale
- 7 Monitor and evaluate the outcome Assess the impact of the decision and make adjustments as needed
