exploration of new teaching methods in non english speaking countries and regions still needs to grow based on the author s experience of teaching
geographical thinking and human cultural geography for more than ten years the book links geographical thinking to the realistic cases with new

social media tools such as wechat app and blog under the guidance of these new methods such as poem emotional couplet game keywords blog based teaching and the like students are transformed from passive recipients of knowledge to active learners and even creators in the end the book which focuses on and pioneers new teaching methodology or methods is used as a reference by scholars researchers practitioners and readers specialized in fields such as geography education and pedagogy

this timely book examines advances in teaching and learning at undergraduate level from the disciplines of geography education neuroscience and learning science connecting these disciplines the chapters integrate research on how students learn and explain how to teach students to think geographically and develop a deeper understanding of their world

the researcher investigated to what extent advanced placement reg ap human geography teacher rsquo s pedagogical and content approaches aligned with william pattison rsquo s noted articulations in geography education a qualitative case study methodology was used to explore ap human geography teacher perceptions of william pattison rsquo s geography content and curriculum suggestions william d pattison had an enduring influence on geography education in the united states he clarified and articulated the academic discipline of geography amidst changes in the academy and secondary geography schooling during the 1960s similarly over 50 years later high school geography finds itself amidst an educational environment of college and career readiness initiatives and high stakes testing the study compared teacher responses with pedagogical recommendations within the advisory paper for teachers associated with the high school geography project and geography content within the four

traditions of geography additionally the investigation examined ap human geography teacher experiences with geography content training seven ap human geography teachers at seven different high schools in a southeastern state provided semi structured in depth interviews addressing the following four research questions 1 what are high school geography teachers rsquo perceptions of pattison rsquo s pedagogical approaches 2 what are high school geography teachers rsquo perceptions of pattison rsquo s geography content approaches 3 to what extent are ap human geography teachers guided by content and pedagogical approaches aligned with william pattison rsquo s four traditions of geography and advisory paper 4 what are high school geography teacher experiences in geography content training the researcher identified four themes within the investigation 1 inquiry approaches aligned with william pattison rsquo s pedagogy are embraced among ap human geography teachers 2 ap human geography teachers support weaving william pattison rsquo s area studies tradition within a thematic curriculum 3 the importance of ap human geography collaborative teacher communities and 4 limitations in college geography presented a challenge for teaching ap human geography the study offers recommendations for future research

prescribed content to be covered and instead emphasises that geography is underpinned by a small number of key concepts that provide the building blocks for curriculum planning the new national curriculum for geography identifies 7 concepts place space scale interdependence physical and human processes environmental interaction and sustainable development and cultural understanding and diversity and these areas are reflected in the book's table of contents this focus on concepts represents a significant shift in how geography is to be taught in schools yet there has been little extended discussion of what a concept led approach to teaching and learning would entail this book will provide geography teachers with a theoretically robust and practical approach to curriculum planning based on the concepts that underpin the subject
