rather than telling students what to think about moral issues this new text teaches students how to think for themselves using real world examples and vivid illustrations drawn from other disciplines it challenges preconceived notions about morality and demonstrates why ethics matters a companion volume readings in moral philosophy provides primary selections that amplify issues discussed in the text and extends them to problems in applied ethics

this textbook draws on most of the major theoretical positions but eschews the traditional historical approach and the use of names and schools of thought as organizing devices and instead focuses on the ideas themselves in doing so it exposes a number of common confusions and misunderstandings about morality and presents a strong argument for some indisputable truths in relation to the moral sphere

this is an ideal introduction to moral philosophy for beginning students and general readers dealing with the philosophical theories which often lie behind everyday opinions and inviting the reader to examine those theories thoroughly using numerous examples and diagrams professor bond guides the reader through the key problems of theoretical ethics seeking to outline a substantial view of morality in universal practical reason he concludes in an attempt to show that a viable universal morality can only relate to the thriving flourishing or well being of individuals in a community

the ninth edition of the moral of the story represents 25 years of editions with the publication year of the first being 1994 like the previous editions of the moral of the story the ninth edition is a combination of classical questions in ethical theory and contemporary issues the general concept remains the same that discussions about moral issues can be facilitated using stories as examples as a form of ethics lab where solutions can be tried out under controlled conditions the book is written primarily for such college courses as introduction to ethics moral philosophy and

introduction to philosophy values

this accessible overview of classical and modern moral theory with short readings provides comprehensive coverage of ethics and unique coverage of rights justice liberty and law real life cases introduce each chapter while the book's content is theoretical rather than applied ethics beauchamp consistently applies the theories to practical moral problems aristotle hume kant and mill are at the books core and they are placed in the context of moral philosophical controversies of the last 30 years in this edition one third of the reading selections are new and all the selections in chapter 8 on rights are new chapter 7 on hume has been heavily reshaped chapter 1 has been reduced to get students past introductory material and into the philosophers

for the introductory course in ethics basic moral problems or advanced courses in moral theory morality and the meaning of life offers a jargon free approach without sacrificing the rigors of logic

bernard williams's remarkable essay on morality confronts the problems of writing moral philosophy and offers a stimulating alternative to more systematic accounts that seem nevertheless to have left all the important issues somewhere off the page williams explains analyzes and distinguishes a number of key positions from the purely amoral to notions of subjective or relative morality testing their coherence before going on to explore the nature of goodness in relation to responsibilities and choice roles standards and human nature

originally published in 1921 updated in 1932 and re issued in 1966 with an introduction by stephan körner this book remains a classic introduction to the study of ethics it clearly explains both the aristotelian and the kantian approach to ethical problems by combining the advantages of a historical and systematic introduction much of the book is devoted to aristotle and kant whose moral theories are important and who are influential forces in contemporary moral philosophy

moral psychology is the systematic inquiry into how morality works when it does work and breaks down when it doesn't work in this comprehensive new textbook mark alfano outlines the five central concepts in the study of moral psychology agency patency sociality temporality and reflexivity subsequent chapters each assess a key area of research which alfano relates both to the five central concepts and to empirical findings he then

draws out the philosophical implications of those findings before suggesting future directions for research one of alfano s guiding themes is that moral philosophy without psychological content is empty whereas psychological investigation without philosophical insight is blind he advocates and demonstrates a holistic vision that pictures moral psychology as a project of collaborative inquiry into the descriptive and normative aspects of the human condition featuring a glossary of technical terms further reading sections and chapter by chapter study questions this rich systematic and accessible introduction to moral psychology will be suitable for both undergraduates and researchers in philosophy psychology and related fields

originally published in 1948 and reprinted in 1955 and updated in 1961 this book is a straightforward account of moral philosophy for students it discusses comprehensively the contributions made by 20th century moralists both in terms of the interpretation of their predecessors and original ethical speculation

excerpt from moral theory an introduction to ethics this book is intended to serve as an introduction to ethics as opposed to a handbook or manual the difference between the two as i conceive it lies in the fact that the one is intended to start the student on the subject and then leave him to pursue his own investigations while the other aims at giving him some sort of assistance throughout their course the manual therefore would have to give some account of all the chief ethical theories and all the chief ethical problems whereas this is just what the introduction would avoid in attempting to write an introduction in this sense i have followed a method which is very common in teaching and lecturing but has not been much used in published work that is i have taken after a brief introduction to the subject two specimen authors or rather two specimen works representing different points of view and have examined and criticized them in some detail these works should really be read by the student in conjunction with or before my own book but to avoid overburdening him or her with too much reading at the outset of the subject i have confined myself with slight exceptions to the consideration of these two works and have said as little as possible about the general philosophical views of the authors or even about their other ethical writings as i hope that this book may be of use to students who can read no language but english i have quoted throughout from standard translations of the works in question in the case of aristotle s ethics i have used peters translation and for kant s fundamental principles i have used the translation by dr t k abbott about

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overview what makes an action right or wrong why is something good or bad how does one make moral decision about what is right and good these are among the main questions in ethics that are the subject of moral theory this book explores some of the most historically important and currently debated moral theories about the nature of the right and good after introducing students in the first chapter to some of the main aims and methods of evaluating a moral theory the remaining chapters in this book are devoted to an examination of various moral theories including the divine command theory moral relativism natural law theory kant's moral theory moral pluralism virtue ethics and moral particularism providing an introduction to moral theory that explains and critically examines the theories of such classical moral philosophers as aristotle aquinas kant bentham mill and ross this book acquaints students with the work of contemporary moral philosophers

how are the demands of morality related to the needs interests and projects of people are they a burden or are they good for us are they nothing but arbitrary impositions or should we expect them to be justified and will the answers to these questions tell us why and whether we should be moral in this short accessible text william nelson poses these questions in a form appropriate for beginning students and treats them in a way that both they and their teachers will appreciate in the company of major figures from the history of ethics nelson explores the key issues surrounding topics like egoism altruism the good life and the requirements of morality a special strength of his presentation is the way he demonstrates how the views of these historical figures prefigure the theories espoused by different schools of contemporary thought students get not only the historical positions in terms of which contemporary debates are framed but also up to date discussions of utilitarianism contractualism problems of collective action and the relations between virtue and duty based theories nelson's own view that morality is not a

single subject matter enables him to show how each of the historical traditions has a role to play in a coherent and defensible pluralistic account of morality at the core of this pluralism is a commitment to the democratic view that morality must not merely serve practical human purposes but it must also be justified to the people it governs imaginative and insightful intelligent and informed this is an excellent first text for students of ethics and the history of ethics

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
