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while ethics has been addressed in the health care literature relatively little attention has been paid to the subject in the field of social care this book redresses the balance by examining theory research policy and practice in both fields the analysis is set within the context of contemporary challenges facing health and social care not only in Britain but internationally contributors from the UK US and Australia consider ethical issues in health and social care research and governance interprofessional and user perspectives ethics in relation to human rights the law finance management and provision key issues of relevance to vulnerable groups such as children and young people those with complex disabilities older people and those with mental health problems and lifecourse issues ethical perspectives on a range of challenging areas from new technologies of reproduction to euthanasia this book is intended for academics students and researchers in health and social care who need an up to date analysis of contemporary issues and debates it will also be useful to practitioners in the public private and voluntary sectors including social workers community workers those working in the fields of disability and mental health and with older people

as more and more people survive into old age the burden of caring for them becomes greater and greater although it is now possible to alleviate many of the afflictions that beset mankind no society can afford to pay for all the healthcare that is now available or technically possible people working in healthcare increasingly have to do more with less rationing takes many forms mostly covert and the less privileged in most societies end up struggling to get their proper share of the available healthcare resources all too often those in the front line have to deal with the consequences of this rationing by default healthcare professionals find themselves rushed off their feet simply doing the basic tasks and completing all the paperwork placing frail sick people in ever lengthening queues sometimes asking them to wait for hours in the middle of the night under uncomfortable and even unsafe conditions and worst of all working under conditions they would rather avoid in which the safety margin for those they are caring for has been greatly diminished we are all aware that under these conditions the chance of making a mistake which can seriously harm or even lead to the death of a patient is greatly increased but what can be done about this how can you be sure that you are doing the right thing when faced with having to practise an uncertain science on vulnerable patients in a complex system under ever changing conditions at what point could you cross the invisible line from reasonable to irresponsible or unethical behaviour by tolerating conditions or tacitly accepting practices which may be regarded as unacceptable even though you may have little immediate control over them this book is a guide to getting it right for healthcare professionals it is about doing the right thing in the right way at the right time for the right people these are the dimensions of quality in healthcare and although some are in conflict equitable access and efficiency for example adherence to ethical practice and professional behaviour will help lead healthcare practitioners through the minefield of responsibilities and priorities real life situations are integral to the book with over 500 clinical examples referred to within the text

dealing primarily with nursing in south africa and the particular challenges that the country s nurses encounter this book looks at the ethical questions confronting nurses as well as the moral philosophy behind those considerations ubuntu the african notion that everyone in a community is responsible for the welfare of its members plays a large part in the moral deliberations of the book as do problems particular to south africa this second edition is updated with new case studies on the aids pandemic as well as new ethical questions stemming from the legalization of abortion in south africa and the rise in the power of health worker

the goal of this open access book is to develop an approach to clinical health care ethics that is more accessible to and usable by health professionals than the now dominant approaches that focus for example on the application of ethical principles the book elaborates the view that health professionals have the emotional and intellectual resources to discuss and address ethical issues in clinical health care without needing to rely on the expertise of bioethicists the early chapters review the history of bioethics and explain how academics from outside health care came to dominate the field of health care ethics both in professional schools and in clinical health care the middle chapters elaborate a series of concepts drawn from philosophy and the social sciences that set the stage for developing a framework that builds upon the individual moral experience of health professionals that explains the discontinuities between the demands of bioethics and the experience and perceptions of health professionals and that enables the articulation of a full theory of clinical ethics with clinicians themselves as the foundation against that background the first of three chapters on professional education presents a general framework for teaching clinical ethics the second discusses how to integrate ethics into formal health care curricula and the third addresses the opportunities for teaching available in clinical settings the final chapter empowering clinicians brings together the various dimensions of the argument and anticipates potential questions about the framework developed in earlier chapters

this volume is the result of a conference sponsored by the medical alumni association of the university of california davis and held in sacramento california in january 2000 the purpose of this conference was to examine the impact of various health care structures on the ability of health care professionals to practice in an ethically acceptable manner one of the ground assumptions made is that ethical practice in medicine and its related fields is difficult in a setting that pays only lip service to ethical principles the limits of ethical possibility are created by the system within which health care professionals must practice when for example ethical practice necessitates as it generally does that health care professionals spend sufficient time to come to know and understand their patients goals and values but the system mandates that only a short time be spent with each patient ethical

practice is made virtually impossible one of our chief frustrations in teaching health care ethics at medical colleges is that we essentially teach students to do something they are most likely to find impossible to do that is get to know and appreciate their patients goals and values there are other ways in which systems alter ethical possibilities in a system in which patients have a different physician outside the hospital than they will inside ethical problems have a different shape than if the treating physician is the same person

here erich h loewy expands on his earlier book textbook of medical ethics 1989 offering healthcare workers and students a new perspective on ethical practice textbook of healthcare ethics focuses on the social conditions in which medical practice occurs and how ethical healthcare decisions involves nurses social workers psychologists technicians and patients as well as physicians this thoroughly revised and expanded edition addresses historical and theoretical underpinnings and practical concerns a series of case studies serve as a guideline for further discussion the text examines provocative issues such as organ donation care of the terminally ill abortion hiv positive healthcare professionals physician assisted suicide and experimentation with fetal tissue this is an ideal book for all members of the healthcare team as well as students and residents in any discipline of medicine
