just as class is a key term for understanding modern europe so hierarchy and order are the key terms for the earlier period these exceptional essays by some of the leading historians in the field are designed to allow students to get a better grasp on this critical subject life in the late medieval and early modern periods was simply organized in a very different way to that of the industrial or post industrial society we are accustomed to each essay tackles a different aspect of this european wide experience whether looking at the nobility the gentry the commons or the religious castes the contributors greatly increase our ability to understand the complex and fascinating phenomenon of how society ticks and how it is perceived by its members to tick

written using critical theory especially by walter benjamin blanchot and derrida allegory and the work of melancholy the late medieval and shakespeare reads medieval and early modern texts exploring allegory within texts allegorical readings of texts and melancholy in texts authors studied are langland and chaucer huccleve on his madness lydgate and henryson shakespeare s first tetralogy the three parts of henry vi and richard iii conclude this

investigation of death mourning madness and of complaint benjamin s writings on allegory inspire this linking which also considers durer baldung and holbein and the dance of the dead motifs the study sees subjectivity created as obsessional paranoid and links melancholia madness and allegorical creation where parts of the subject are split off from each other and speak as wholes allegory and melancholy are two modes a state of writing and a state of being where the subject fragments or disappears these texts are aware of the power of death within writing which makes them fascinating the book will appeal to readers of literature from the medieval to the baroque and to those interested in critical theory and histories of visual culture

this volume is the first general anthology devoted specifically to the period 1400 1530 the courtly game of love continues in poems by sophisticated disciples of chaucer

the late middle ages c 1200 1500 was an age of transition the major events of this period the black death the hundred years war the rise of parliament the depositions of five english kings between 1327 and 1483 are examined in detail in this book

offered here for the first time the essays represent the most recent formulations of a wide variety of specialists within their own areas of expertise while collectively contributing to the current historiographical debates about continuity and discontinuity between the middle ages and the early modern era

this volume examines a number of english manuscripts of the 15th and early 16th centuries never previously studied and all of which make a unique contribution to art history in this period

the single woman is a troubling and disruptive category does it denote all unmarried women therefore creating a group which every female was part of at some stage in her life or were the categories maiden and widow so culturally significant in late medieval england that single woman was a residual category for women seen as anomalous was the category single man used in an equivalent way and if not why this study offers a way into the complex process of social classification in late medieval england all societies use classifications in order to understand and impose order in this book cordelia beattie views classification as a political act an act of power those classifying must make choices about which divisions are most important or about who falls into which category and such choices have repercussions defining how a group or an individual should be labelled means variables such as social status gender or age are prioritized rather than isolate gender as a variable this book examines how it relates to other social cleavages using a variety of approaches from social and cultural history to gender history and medieval studies its original methodology offers an innovative approach to a range of historical texts from pastoral manuals to tax returns and guild registers

this is a wide ranging collection of essays from a variety of critical perspectives exploring alternative ways of understanding the entertainments mystery plays civic pageants courtly masques and professional dramas of late medieval and renaissance england

the unique contribution of venomous tongues lies in its interdisciplinary approach and the way it situates scolding within a broader range of issues specific to the legal and social history of the period l r poos the catholic university of america

the interest of the writers of these essays in the intricacies and implications of translation in the middle ages or of the translation of medieval texts in to modern period has resulted in a diverse and intellectually stimulating volume the papers in this volume written in either english french or spanish approach translation from a wide variety of perspectives and offer a range of

interpretations of the concept of translation the volume contains essays ranging in time from the anglo saxon period to the present and in topic from medieval recipe books to arguments in favour of women administering the sacrament languages studied include non european languages as well as latin and numerous european vernaculars as both source and target languages as any translator or student of translation quickly becomes aware it is impossible to divorce language from culture all the contributors to this volume struggle with the complexities of translation as a cultural act even when the focus would seem to be specifically linguistic it is these complexities which lend the study of the theory and practice of translation in the middle ages its enduring fascinatio

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
