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art in renaissance italy sets the art of that time in its context exploring why it was created and in particular looking at who commissioned the palaces and cathedrals the paintings and the sculptures

many famous artworks of the italian renaissance were made to celebrate love marriage and family they were the pinnacles of a

tradition dating from early in the era of commemorating betrothals marriages and the birth of children by commissioning extraordinary objects maiolica glassware jewels textiles paintings that were often also exchanged as gifts this volume is the first comprehensive survey of artworks arising from renaissance rituals of love and marriage and makes a major contribution to our understanding of renaissance art in its broader cultural context the impressive range of works gathered in these pages extends from birth trays painted in the early fifteenth century to large canvases on mythological themes that titian painted in the mid 1500s each work of art would have been recognized by contemporary viewers for its prescribed function within the private domestic domain book jacket

campbell and cole respected teachers and active researchers draw on traditional and current scholarship to present complex interpretations in this new edition of their engaging account of italian renaissance art the book s unique decade by decade structure is easy to follow and permits the authors to tell the story of art not only in the great centres of rome florence and venice but also in a range of other cities and sites throughout italy including more in this edition from naples padua and palermo this approach allows the artworks to take centre stage in contrast to the book s competitors which are organized by location or by artist other updates for this edition include an expanded first chapter on the trecento and a new techniques and materials appendix that explains and illustrates all of the major art making processes of the period richly illustrated with high quality reproductions and new photography of recent restorations it presents the classic canon of renaissance painting and sculpture in full while expanding the scope of conventional surveys by offering a more thorough coverage of architecture decorative and domestic arts and print media

this title was first published in 2000 michelangelo gave his painting of leda and the swan to an apprentice rather than hand it over to the emissary of the duke of ferrara who had commissioned it he was apparently disgusted by the failure of the emissary

who was probably more used to buying pigs than discussing art to accord the picture and the artist the value they deserved any discussion of works of art and material culture implicitly assigns them a set of values whether these values be monetary cultural or religious they tend to constrict the ways in which such works can be discussed the variety of potential forms of valuation becomes particularly apparent during the italian renaissance when relations between the visual arts and humanistic studies were undergoing rapid changes against an equally fluid social economic and political background in this volume 13 scholars explicitly examine some of the complex ways in which a variety of values might be associated with italian renaissance material culture papers range from a consideration of the basic values of the materials employed by artists to the manifestation of cultural values in attitudes to dress and domestic devotion by illuminating some of the ways in which values were constructed they provide a broader context within which to evaluate renaissance material culture

vasari s celebration of the art of the central italian cities of florence rome and venice has long left in shadow the art of northern italy the economic and historical decline of the region compounded this effect with the dispersal of the treasures of the farnese to naples the este to dresden and the gonzaga to madrid and paris each chapter in this volume celebrates a stunning work from the region among them correggio s famed camera di san paolo in parma parmigianino s camerino in the rocca sanvitale near parma the studiolo of alberto pio at carpi and the tomb of the ancestors in the tempio malatestiano in rimini the volume as a whole offers fascinating insights into the tussle between the maniera moderna and the maniera devota in the first half of the sixteenth century when the unity between the elegance and beauty of art and its religious significance came under debate around the year 1550 when michelangelo s last judgement came under attack for impiety and lasciviousness and the reformists called for an art that would invoke in the viewer a devotional response that identified manifestations of the divine with human feelings and emotions in northern italy it was on the foundation laid by correggio with his tenderness and ability to evoke the softness of living flesh that the carracci brothers built their reform of painting

representing renaissance art c 1500 c 1600 is a study of change and continuity in the iconographics of art and the visual representation of artists during the 16th century especially in italy and the netherlands this book considers the maintenance of well established traditions for the visual representation of artists and also examines the new iconographics that emerged in the 16th century by highlighting art and architecture which artists designed for their personal use including the decoration of their houses this study provides insight into the tastes and ways of looking special to artists by examining the visual evidence we see the opinions both of artists who expressed their views in literary texts and additionally those of artists who did not publish their ideas in written form

renaissance art history is traditionally identified with italian centers of production and florence in particular instead this book explores the dynamic interchange between european artistic centers and artists and the trade in works of art it also considers the impact of differing locations on art and artists and some of the economic political and cultural factors crucial to the emergence of an artistic center during c 1420 1520 no city or court could succeed in isolation and so artists operated within a network of interests and local and international identities the case studies presented in this book portray the renaissance as an exciting international phenomenon with cities and courts inextricably bound together in a web of economic and political interests
