on situations where academic librarians have developed curriculum based sessions and or become involved in curriculum committees this volume describes and provides examples of librarians varied roles in the curriculum of education programs these roles include semester long or multi session instructor web based course designer problem based learning facilitator and member of a curriculum committee in addition to describing the roles that librarians have in supporting curriculum the book describes how to carry out those roles with sections devoted to adult learning theory teaching methods developing learning objectives and working with faculty to develop curriculum examples of library sessions devoted to information literacy evidence based practice information literacy and biomedical informatics are included this book is not limited to one mode of delivering information and covers examples of face to face distance and blended learning initiatives
