Two of the three textbook equivalent texts examined in this study fit the learners' reading level while most learners felt one of the texts was too difficult to read. L2 readers have diverse profiles and they develop their componential skills in different ways whereas the crucial role of word level processing in reading remains stable across reader patterns. Generally speaking, the three diagnostic instruments were moderately difficult for the participants in this study and the two oral reading tasks were more challenging than the word segmentation. The quantity and quality of learners' errors when completing these three diagnostic instruments reveal rich information about their reading processes and problems. The findings offered strong support for the three instruments as effective tools for diagnostic purposes in Chinese lower level L2 reading instruction and indicated the importance of developing reading fluency and training word level processing skills.
