prosodic phonology by marina nespør and irene vogel is now available again nespør vogel 1986 is a citation classic even after twenty years it is still recognized as the standard resource on prosodic phonology this groundbreaking work introduces all of the prosodic constituents syllable foot word clitic group phonological phrase intonational phrase and utterance and provides evidence for each one from numerous languages prosodic phonology also includes a chapter in which experimental psycholinguistic data support the proposed hierarchy a perceptual study provides evidence that prosodic constituent structure not syntactic constituent structure predicts whether listeners are able to disambiguate different types of ambiguous sentences a chapter on the phonology of poetic meter examines portions of dante s divine comedy it is demonstrated that the constituents proposed for spoken language also make interesting predictions about literary metrical patterns prosodic phonology is an important reference not only for phonologists but for all linguists interested in the issue of interfaces among the components of grammar it is also a basic resource for psycholinguists and cognitive scientists working on linguistic perception and language acquisition

the purpose of the is study is 1 to trace the evolution of the prosodic structure of french from lsl over of to

the modern period in terms of a nexus cursus typology and 2 to describe the phonotactic structures of and mf and to outline their diachronic relationship through analysis based on a phonotactic definition of the syllable although two distinct divisions of this study are intended the interrelation of prosodic and phonotactic structures is set forth as a necessary working hypothesis and it will be demonstrated that the establishment of phonological units made on the basis of a prosodic typology must precede a phonotactic description

the phonology of English introduces the subject from an optimality theoretic perspective written by a high profile American phonologist the book presents an analysis of new generalizations about the surface shapes of English words it will not only be the most up to date introduction to English phonology but will also provide the clearest available account of optimality theory its combination of accessibility originality and clear analysis make this essential reading for all those interested in the sounds of English words and some of the latest developments in linguistics theory the phonology of English offers a new approach to English phonology it focuses on the prosody of the language i.e. syllable and foot structure and does so from an optimality theoretic perspective the focus is on surface distributional regularities and the results presented are based on extensive searches through various computerized lexicons the outcome is a number of new generalizations about the phonology of English along with confirmation of some familiar regularities all of these empirical results are discussed in detail and presented in extensive charts with a plethora of examples the phonology of English also offers a unique OT analysis this provides a detailed introduction to the intricacies of the theory as applied to a significant amount of data a number of important theoretical proposals are developed in this model and the analysis presents the idea that certain complex constraints and their ranking can be derived in restricted ways from more basic constraints in addition the book also develops the idea that syllables of English can contain from zero to three moras it is suggested that the phonology of English only makes sense if partial morphemes of the *cranberry* sort are licensed more widely the book is thus intended as a detailed presentation of novel empirical results about the sound system of English along with important theoretical results about phonological theory

the present volume consists of nine articles dealing with the role of the constituent phonological word or prosodic word in various typologically diverse languages these languages and their respective families subsume indo european dutch german english european portuguese bantu siswati kinande algonquian cree siouan dakota and salishan lushootseed one contribution examines the phonological word in a sign language the theoretical issues dealt with in the book include evidence for the phonological word e g rules phonotactics syllabification stress patterns the connection between morphosyntactic and prosodic structure e g alignment phenomena in optimality theory and the relationship between the phonological word and other prosodic constituents e g the prosodic representation of clitics the volume will be of interest to all linguists and advanced students of linguistics working on prosodic phonology phonology morphology and phonology syntax interface and optimality theory

findings in key areas of prosodic theory including the relationship between intonation and pragmatics in speech production sentence modality prosody characterization the role of pitch in quantity based sound systems consonant conditioned tone depression phonology across languages the encoding of intonational contrasts in both intonational and tonal languages featuring new data and ground breaking results the papers draw on empirical approaches that analyze production perception and comprehension experiments such as the prepared speech paradigm and semantic scaling tasks these are discussed in a variety of languages some underrepresented in the literature such as french and estonian while others such as shekgalagari are examined in this way for the first time this collection of cutting edge material will be of interest to a broad range of language researchers

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
