

Gabriel Orozco Asterisms

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gabriel orozco's asterisms is a two part sculptural and photographic installation comprising thousands of items of detritus he gathered at two sites a playing field near his home in new york city and a coastal wildlife reserve in baja california mexico presented as a taxonomic study of material shape size and colour the exhibition highlights orozco's subtle practice of subjecting the world to personal idiosyncratic systems while invoking several of the artist's recurring motifs including the effects of erosion the poetry of the mundane the relationship between the macro and the micro and the tension between nature and culture nancy spector deputy director and chief curator of the guggenheim museum contributes an essay to this richly illustrated volume

asterisms is the 18th project in deutsche guggenheim's series of artwork commissions the

exhibition is a two part photographic and sculptural installation comprising thousands of items of detritus that the artist has gathered from two sites a playing field near his home in new york and a protected coastal biosphere in baja california sur mexico that is also the repository for industrial and commercial waste from across the pacific ocean

an argument for the centrality of the visual culture of waste as seen in works by international contemporary artists to the study of our ecological condition ecological crisis has driven contemporary artists to engage with waste in its most non biodegradable forms plastics e waste toxic waste garbage hermetically sealed in landfills in this provocative and original book amanda boetzkes links the increasing visualization of waste in contemporary

art to the rise of the global oil economy and the emergence of ecological thinking often when art is analyzed in relation to the political scientific or ecological climate it is considered merely illustrative boetzkes argues that art is constitutive of an ecological consciousness not simply an extension of it the visual culture of waste is central to the study of the ecological condition boetzkes examines a series of works by an international roster of celebrated artists including thomas hirschhorn francis alÿs song dong tara donovan agnès varda gabriel orozco and mel chin among others mapping waste art from its modernist origins to the development of a new waste imaginary generated by contemporary artists boetzkes argues that these artists do not offer a predictable or facile critique of consumer culture bearing this in mind she explores the ambivalent relationship between waste both aestheticized and reviled and a global economic regime that curbs energy expenditure while promoting profitable forms of resource consumption

discussions of the object as a key to understanding central aspects of modern and contemporary art artists increasingly refer to post object based work while theorists engage with material artifacts in culture a focus on object based learning treats objects as vectors for dialogue across disciplines virtual imaging enables the object to be abstracted or circumvented while immaterial forms of labor challenge materialist theories this anthology surveys such reappraisals of what constitutes the objectness of production with art as its focus among the topics it examines are the relation of the object to subjectivity distinctions between objects and things the significance of the object's transition from inert mass to tool or artifact and the meanings of the everyday in the found object repetition in the replicated or multiple object loss in the absent object and abjection in the formless or degraded object it also explores artistic positions that are anti object theories of the experimental liminal or mental object and the role of objects in performance the object becomes a prism through which to reread contemporary art and better understand its recent past artists surveyed include georges adéagbo art in ruins iain baxter louise bourgeois pavel büchler lygia clark claude closky brian collier jimmie durham fischli weiss luca frei meschac gaba isa genzken

moonheart journey through the zodiac the moon has always been a silent guardian watching over the world from the night sky but what if the moon could walk among us feeling learning and growing in moonheart the moon embarks on a magical journey through the zodiac stepping into each sign's unique world and experiencing their emotions strengths and vulnerabilities along the way she makes friends faces challenges and uncovers the rich

human experiences reflected in the stars from aries's bravery to pisces's compassion each zodiac sign offers a new lesson about love resilience fear and hope through this cosmic adventure the moon learns what it truly means to be human a luminous story of transformation friendship and self discovery moonheart inspires readers to embrace their inner light and shadows as well as the beauty of the universe

i've learned to read jeff cannon first a read through to get the general feel of the poem then i go back and do a line by line slow read to try and get an idea of the poet's feeling motivation to have written these invariably graphic images of pain mourning and revulsion that to me are reminiscent of the work of José Clemente Orozco day and night dance together in the silence of a desire that sought more than a sip of pleasure when he launches against the dark soul of the caucasoid empire he does not pull back the punches which by the way are not sterile or blind rage expressions of innocence lost or nostalgic feelings for a life that is no more jeff is as relentless as the sick system he indicts with the big difference that the poet unlike that corrupted and corrupting force offers us a glimpse of hope in a humanity not quite totally lost not quite totally empty i read his poetry and feel exhausted but not drained exposed but not shamed edified but not through false hope enlightened but not tempted into orthodoxy and always in awe of someone who knows his self and is willing to expose himself in the splendor of his nakedness as i understand his poetic purpose he does not intend to hang the reader out to dry and closer to suicide personal or collective but rather as he honestly exhibits the emperor without clothes you see a tender and loving heart that's beaconing us warning us of the pitfalls toils and snares we have already come through not only not to stumble with the same rock time and again but to remove or at least clearly mark the obstacles for the benefit of the reader his poetry is therefore one of deep compassion and love alfonso maciel alfonso knows poetry feels poetry knows color feels color feels the color of people the texture of their want for freedom to live the wondrous art of their lives

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
