who is to blame by alhaji mohamed abu sesay in his quiet moments author alhaji mohamed abu sesay reads a lot of novels he reads religious books to enlighten himself to god s word outside of reading he jokes a lot with his children and meets friends on weekends he is married with six children despite his ability to work in the civil service his passion has always been teaching

herzen s novel played a significant part in the intellectual ferment of the 1840s it is an important book in social and moral terms and wonderfully expressive of herzen s personality isaiah berlinalexander herzen was one of the major figures in russian intellectual life in the nineteenth century who is to blame was his first novel a revealing document and a noteworthy contribution to russian literature in its own right it establishes the origins of herzen s spiritual quest and the outlines of his emerging social and political beliefs and it foreshadows his mature philosophical views

the oxford handbook of the russian novel brings together top specialists in russian literature to treat the russian novel from the late 18th to the 21st century using a range of interpretive perspectives the russian novel is a distinctive tradition by virtue of its formal

eccentricities as well as the boldness with which these works approached the most complex philosophical political and moral questions this handbook treats well known works and authors but also explores the much broader tradition of the russian novel up to the present the essays in the handbook provide cultural and historical perspectives on the russian novel as well as showcasing emergent modes of analysis including postcolonialism ecocriticism and posthumanism

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this book draws on the philosopher rené girard to argue that three twentieth century american novels jeffrey eugenides *s the virgin suicides* rick moody *s the ice storm* and richard yates *s revolutionary road* are tragedies until now girardian literary analysis has generally focused on representations of human desire in texts and neglected both other emotions and the place of tragedy carly osborn addresses these omissions by using girardian theory to present evidence that novels can indeed be tragedies the book advances the scholarship of tragedy that has run from aristotle to nietzsche to terry eagleton proposing a new way to read modern novels through ancient traditions in addition this is the first work to examine the place of women as victims or in girardian terms scapegoats in twentieth century fiction specifically by considering the representation of women *s* bodies and ambivalence about their identities in deploying a rich and vivid array of tragic tropes *the virgin suicides* *the ice storm* and *revolutionary road* participate in a deep rooted american tragic tradition tragic novels the american dream and rené girard will be of interest to those working at the intersection of philosophy and literature as well as girard specialists

mauprat features edmee a self actualizing woman as hero protagonist here the notion of fiction of relationship emerges as male russian authors created tragic idealized woman characters who could never really live up to the terrible perfection with which they were endowed

victims of the book uncovers a long neglected but once widespread subgenre the fin de si cle novel of formation in france novels about and geared toward adolescent male readers were imbued with a deep worry over young frenchmen s masculinity as evidenced by titles like crise de jeunesse youth in crisis 1897 la crise virile crisis of virility 1898 la vie st rile a sterile life 1892 and la mortelle impuissance deadly impotence 1903 in this book fran ois proulx examines a wide panorama of these novels many of which have rarely been studied as well as polemical essays pedagogical articles and medical treatises on the perceived threats posed by young frenchmen s reading habits against this cultural backdrop he illuminates all that was at stake in representations of the male reader by prominent novelists of the period including jules vall s paul bourget maurice barr s andr gide and marcel proust in the final decades of the nineteenth century social commentators insistently characterized excessive reading as an emasculating illness that afflicted french youth fin de si cle writers responded to this pathologization of reading with a profusion of novels addressed to young male readers paradoxically proposing their own novels as potential cures in the early twentieth century this corpus was critically revisited by a new generation of writers victims of the book shows how gide and proust in particular reworked the fin de si cle paradox to subvert cultural norms about literature and masculinity proposing instead a queer pact between writer and reader
