surveys the pre christian beliefs of the scandinavian and germanic peoples provides an introduction to this subject giving basic outlines to the sagas and stories and helps identify the charachter traits of not only the well known but also the lesser gods of the age

most people know of valhalla the world tree and the gods of norse mythology or the strange hunts and voyages of the ancient lrish tales yet few people realise the significance of the similarities and contrasts between the religions of the pre christian people of north western europe the celts and germans and scandinavians had much in common in their religious practices and beliefs and this is the first serious attempt that has been made to compare them there are striking resemblances in their ideas about battle goddesses and protective spirits holy places sacrificial rituals divination and ideas about the other world and myths and symbols in pagan europe poses questions like do such parallels go back to early times or are they owing to late viking contact hilda ellis davidson has worked for many years on pre christian scandinavian and germanic religion and now compares them with the celts from the background of previous studies using evidence from archaeology iconography later literature and folklore in a search for basic patterns which will add to our knowledge of the early peoples in europe aimed at teachers and libraries but also accessible to students of history religion and celtic norse and german languages and cultures

mankind has given a recognizable face to the awesome and impalpable forces of nature in the image of the green man and the nature spirits that this book explores the ways in which different societies and different craftsmen have depicted these spirits display the wide creative range of the human imagination but the persistence of the theme suggests that in all their many facets these spirits represent a deep primordial sense that humans have shared since civilization began for the very origin and message of these images have remained the same even if somewhat altered over time traditional customs from around the world from the rites that celebrate spring and egg on the forces of fertility to folk health remedies and the use of talismans to ward off illness and other evils show some surprising similarities and hint at the shared origins of human culture even though the original significance of many customs has been lost or diluted they still hold an appeal and many towns even today are re introducing seasonal fairs to recreate the link between man and nature varner presents examples ancient and new from europe and asia east coast and west and identifies in particular the different guises of the green man who has figured in architecture since before the advent of christianity and still makes his appearance today peering out from behind his leaves on california banks and new york brownstone houses

in ancient cosmologies 1975 nine eminent scholars seek to answer the question what was the shape of the universe imagined by those ancient peoples to whom all modern knowledge of geography and astronomy was inaccessible how did the ancient egyptians babylonians jews indians chinese arabs greeks and norsemen conceive the form of the cosmos which accommodated not only the known face of the earth and the visible heavenly bodies but also those other worlds which it was deemed necessary to locate comprehensibly in space the realms of the dead both blessed and damned and the countries inhabited by gods and demons

extending from the dawn of creation to the present ashavid by eric dryden is both a religious manifesto and an inspired scholarly narrative ashavid focuses on the ancient nordic indo europeans and the divine revelation of their prophet zarathustra the first to proclaim the one creator god and to reveal the spiritual and ethical path leading to both a good earthly life and eternal life it describes ancient west asia s ethnic and cultural transformations the corruptions of zarathustra s ashavid doctrine and the indo europeans genetic and cultural adulterations resulting from their migrations into alien lands it discusses the indo europeans merger with old europe s sub races to form the nordkind people and the threats to nordkind s survival in our own era ashavid is an eye opening epic for european descended men and women who seek to live in harmony with the divinely created natural law called asha

when i studied these manuals a source then little exploited i noticed that the academic like the merchant was justified by reference to the labor he accomplished the novelty of the academics thus ultimately appeared to lie in their role as intellectual workers my attention was therefore drawn to two notions whose ideological avatars i attempted to trace through the concrete social conditions in which they developed these notions were labor and time under these two heads i maintain two open files from which some of the articles collected here are drawn i am still persuaded that attitudes toward work and time are essential aspects of social structure and function and that the study of such attitudes offers a useful tool for the historian who wishes to examine the societies in which they develop preface page xii

the second volume of old norse folklore explores medieval and early modern nordic magic and witchcraft covering syncretism continuity survival and the reconstruction of pagan beliefs and cultic practices in this last area of western europe to be christianized this volume not only considers these issues but also pulls back the curtain on more obscure yet important corners

of nordic magico religious tradition in these chapters stephen a mitchell draws on materials from many different periods of the vast nordic world stretching from greenland to the baltic and examines such diverse witnesses as sagas judicial records ballads synodal statutes runes proverbs church murals leechbooks and the language used to discuss magic and its actors old norse folklore addresses how theology helped to shape the nordic magical world and how language can reveal this world how magic was used as a practical matter in and what it meant philosophically to the medieval nordic world and how inherited traditions between and among the historically connected societies of northern europe impacted cultural developments in late medieval scandinavia

the myths of the norse god thor were preserved in the icelandic eddas set down in the early middle ages the bane of giants and trolls thor was worshipped as the last line of defence against all that threatened early nordic society thor s significance persisted long after the christian conversion and in the mid eighteenth century thor resumed a symbolic prominence among northern countries admired and adopted in scandinavia and germany he became central to the rhetoric of national romanticism and to more belligerent assertions of nationalism resurrected in the latter part of the twentieth century in marvel magazine thor was further transformed into an articulation both of an anxious male sexuality and of a parallel nervousness regarding american foreign policy martin arnold explores the extraordinary regard in which thor has been held since medieval times and considers why and how his myth has been adopted adapted and transformed

in his introduction to the well of remembrance author ralph metzner provides a telling explanation of the theme of his work this book explores some of the mythic roots of the western worldview the worldview of the culture that for better and worse has come to dominate most of the rest of the world's peoples this domination has involved not only economic and political systems but also values basic attitudes religious beliefs language scientific understanding and technological applications many individuals tribes and nations are struggling to free themselves from the residues of the ideological oppression practiced by what they see as eurocentric culture they seek to define their own ethnic or national identities by referring to ancestral traditions and mythic patterns of knowledge at this time it seems appropriate for europeans and euro americans likewise to probe their own ancestral mythology for insight and self understanding focusing on the mythology and worldview of the pre christian germanic tribes of northern europe metzner offers a meaningful exploration of western ancestry

in the real middle earth explore the magically enchanting early english civilization on which tolkien based his world of the lord of the rings tolkien readily admitted that the concept of middle earth was not his own invention an old english term for the dark age world it was always assumed that the importance of magic in this world existed only in tolkien s works now professor brian bates reveals the vivid truth about this historical culture behind the stories we know of dark age kings and queens warriors and battles lies the hidden history of middle earth a world of magic mystery and destiny fiery dragons were seen to fly across the sky monsters haunted the marshes and elves fired poisoned arrows wizards cast healing spells wise trees gave blessings and omens foretold the deaths of kings the very landscape itself was enchanted and the world imbued with a life force repressed by a millennium of christianity this belief system all but disappeared leaving only faint traces in folk memory and fairy tales in this remarkable book professor brian bates has drawn on the latest archaeological findings to reconstruct the imaginative world of our past revealing a culture with insights that may yet help us understand our own place in the world

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
